nite wisdom, I thought that would mean 7 weeks at Fort Knox and 11 weeks at Fort Gordon and maybe the war would be over by then! Well I did copy 5 words and finished training by the end of May 1968. About every 10th class of radio teletype operators got sent to Europe and assigned embassy duty or other such assignments or so we were led to believe. None of our class we're that lucky.

After a few weeks at home we were off to Viet Nam. In early July our plane landed at Tan Son Nhut and off to the wonderful world of in-processing at Long Bien. Having been awake for over 24 hours (tough to sleep on a plane) some got KP, some got to build concrete sidewalks and some got other wonderful welcomes to the "Nam".

2013 11th ACVVC Calendar Appeal

The 2013 11th ACVVC Calendar was mailed to all members in mid-December. If you haven't received your copy by now please contact Allen Hathaway or Pete Walter. The new calendar features 14 full-color photos submitted by you the members of the 11th ACVVC! It also includes information on significant dates and events of your regiment's service in Vietnam and Cambodia. We have received many favorable comments on the new color calendar; we hope you enjoy it!

The calendar is one of three fund raising projects that support our Scholarship Program. We also conduct our annual raffle prior to the reunion and the Silent Auction of donated items at the reunion. These activities have flourished over the years thanks to the support of our members. We again appeal to your generosity as we ask for donations to support our Scholarship Program. The Scholarship Fund is a discrete fund that depends solely on your donations. All scholarships, as well as printing and mailing costs associated with the calendar are paid directly from this fund. The number of scholarships awarded each year depends on the total donations made during that year. Without your support the program would not be viable.

Your continued support ensures the calendar will be produced each year. We ask you to support the calendar and Scholarship Program with the most generous taxdeductible donation that you can make to assist the children of 11th ACVVC members commence or continue their post-secondary education in college, trade school, or any other educational training following high school.

In 2012 our goal was to generate \$39,000 in donations in support of the Calendar Fundraising project. Through your generosity we exceeded that goal. After printing and mailing costs, your donations totaled \$49,000! In 2012 our combined fund raising activities throughout the year allowed us to award scholarships to 22 of our children for a total of \$90,000. There were fourteen female recipients and eight males. Their average age was twenty-four and they hailed from fifteen states. Since the inception of the 11th ACVVC you have donated more than \$1,000,000 to scholarships!



For 2013 we have two goals. Our first goal is to generate \$50,000 in donations. We will need your help in attaining this unprecedented level. Many of you have generously donated \$100 to \$500 for this cause. The second goal is to increase the percentage of members making calendar donations to 25%. Over the years the number of members making donations has risen from 20% to 23%. If all of our members contribute \$10 we will generate over \$70,000! To help meet this goal and to ensure that you continue to receive a calendar every year we ask that you please make a donation. Every donation counts, regardless of the amount.

This issue of *Thunder Run is being* mailed to nearly 16,000 Blackhorse troopers who served in Vietnam. This includes members, lapsed members and those who have not yet joined.

If you haven't yet become a member of the 11th ACVVC, or if your membership has expired, this is a good time to take a minute and become a member or renew your membership.

There still may be a bit of confusion about membership in this organization, 11th Armored Cavalry's Veterans of Vietnam and Cambodia (11th ACVVC) and the Blackhorse Association (BHA). They are two separate organizations, each with their own charter, by-laws, officers and membership fees. Many of us are members of and support both organizations. Some of those we have contacted for membership renewal have written back and furnished a copy their LIFE membership card only to discover it is not from the 11th Armored Cavalry's Veterans of Vietnam and Cambodia, but rather the Blackhorse Association.

If you are not sure of your membership status in the 11th ACVVC, take this time to check the mailing label on the back page of this newsletter.

If the words "FREE COPY" are printed on the first line of the label, take this opportunity to join and become a member. If the words "EXPIRED" are printed, this is a good time to renew your membership. Expired members will also have their membership number printed on the same line.

To join or renew your membership

in the 11th ACVVC just fill out and mail the membership form printed in this newsletter. Make sure you give your full name, address, service number, unit(s) and dates in country including month and year. Also include any other information such as nickname, track number, platoon, or section. This will help us match you with others that served in the same unit. We also encourage vou to sign the release line at the bottom of the form. This gives us permission to give your address and/or telephone number to other troopers who may be looking for you. Your name, address, etc. are NOT sold or given out to vendors or anyone other than Blackhorse troopers.

Membership dues are only \$15 per year, or \$100 for a LIFE membership. Over 95 percent of our members are LIFE members. We also offer an easy and convenient LIFE payment plan which divides the \$100 membership dues into four payments of \$25 each. We also accept Visa and MasterCard credit cards for all transactions.

Your membership dues provide you with this quarterly newsletter Thunder Run. The newsletter keeps you informed of your organization, its members, and the activities of the 11th Cavalry, both past and present. We pride ourselves on our continued commitment to bring the news to our members through this newsletter.

Thunder Run has been printed and mailed every three months for the past 27 years. This shows our reliability and commitment to our members.

When you become a member or renew your membership you will receive your new membership card. All members are assigned a membership number that appears on their membership card. LIFE members receive a plastic membership card with their name and membership number. All new members will be listed in the "Welcome New Members" section of Thunder Run. Reunion Assistance Fund

The purpose of the Reunion Trooper and KIA Survivor Assistance Fund is to assist Troopers who served with the 11th Armored Cavalry Regiment in

Vietnam and Cambodia, and family members of our troopers killed in action in Vietnam and Cambodia, to attend a reunion sponsored by the 11th ACVVC. Qualified applicants will be given one or more of the following items, depending on the number of requests, funds depletion, and the degree of assistance required:

1. A room at the host hotel for one or two nights during the reunion weekend.

2. Funds to purchase fuel for auto, tickets for airfare or other means of transportation such as bus fare or train fare.

3. Registration fees.

4. Meals or food allowance.

Funds are collected through direct donations or the "passing of the hat" at the annual membership Business Meeting and are accounted for by the Treasurer. The Treasurer includes the Reunion Trooper and KIA Survivor Assistance Fund as a separate reporting item on the quarterly financial report.

To be considered for financial assistance from the fund to attend a Reunion of the 11th ACVVC, the Trooper or the KIA's immediate family members (defined as Parents, siblings, children, widows) making the request must ...

1. Do so in writing to the Secretary or the President, and

2. Provide evidence of the Trooper's service in Vietnam and/or Cambodia with the 11th Armored Cavalry "Blackhorse" Regiment.

The applicant Trooper or KIA survivor should describe his/her need for monetary assistance, briefly stating his/her financial situation (i.e., job, income, family, or other relevant facts). In addition, the Trooper may be required to show proof that he is a member, or that he is qualified to become a member, of the 11th ACVVC. The Officers and Directors of 11th ACVVC will decide by a majority vote on whom and how much assistance will be given to a Trooper or Survivor of a KIA.

Requests must be submitted no later than August 28, 2013.

After a couple of days of this "fun" several of us were put on a plane to Blackhorse base camp where we were met by our section sergeants and for the first time felt like we belonged. I remember that first night very well. It was dark when we landed and I was taken to the S-2 hooch (HHT S-2 was the Intelligence Section of the TOC) and given a bunk. Being exhausted I had no trouble falling asleep but was woken around midnight by the loudest explosion I had ever heard. No one had told me a 155 howitzer was about 200 feet from our hooch and that H and I rounds were fired throughout the night! Fortunately I did not soil myself! Many months later someone kicked my bunk on the way out of our tent and I asked what was going on and the reply was "In Coming". Guess I got use to the noise!

During my tour, I would occasionally receive gifts from home. For Christmas, my Dad filled a box with cheeses, sausage and other such delicacies along with a small flask of bourbon. Since it was a couple of weeks to Christmas, I waited to open my "present." Big mistake as most of the stuff was moldy by then. Oh well, the bourbon was good. We also had our parents send us Jiffy Pop and often enjoyed that heated over a "C-4" cook stove made from a c ration can.

At one point a friend of mine sent a pack of small wines bottles that I enjoyed sharing with my buddies. One evening I was opening a bottle when we had incoming. Fortunately the bottle had a screw top and none was lost. My buddy had also dug a trench by his bunk that we hopped into with him in front and me behind. Later, he told me, every time a round hit I jerked his belt. I had not realized I had grabbed it! We had some laughs over that one.

As a radio operator, we dealt with call signs and frequent changes of these call signs. I do not know who was assigned to think up these call signs but often wondered how they could think of such silly names. I do not remember most of them but I do remember at one time our call sign was "Witty Grapes." Really? They could not come up with anything better than that?

About half way through the tour, we got about a month of security duty around Tan

Son Nhut air base. This was the only time I saw a real flush toilet and also got to phone home. While there, one of our troops was set up along the Saigon River where an early warning devise was in place. This "high tech" devise was a flock of geese. Our troops had to periodically walk up to the geese at night to see how close they got before the geese honked. Then they had to call in the "Honker" report to me for recording and forwarding to Regiment how close they got to the geese and how many honks occurred.

Our TOC was set up next to an open field at the air base and one day an air force officer came in to notify us that they were going to burn some Av gas on that field next door. I shared this with the officer on duty. Apparently, he failed to let all the other officers know so when the gas was lit, it exploded. We had flames 100 feet in the air. As you can imagine, we had officers running everywhere! What a sight. This happened again but by then communication was much better.

During my tour, we set our HHT TOC at Bandit Hill while assigned to work with the 1st Infantry Division. While there, a platoon of the 1st Infantry was assigned to provide added perimeter security and set up night ambush sites outside the perimeter. Here I was 10,000 miles from home when I see Larry Lade, a kid that lived 4 houses down the street from my home back in the World. A few years ago I saw his mother who told me the war was hard on him. I understood as Larry showed me his helmet that had a bullet hole going through it from a round that just missed.

We did a couple of missions through the Michelin rubber plantation. There we felt the impacts and sounds of B-52 strikes and learned how some of the enemy bunkers even survived these strikes. On the second mission, I was working the midnight to

eight radio shift and we moved each day. By the time we set up in the evening, I was getting 2-3 hours sleep a day (probable normal for a lot of you). By the end of the week being a little grumpy, I got foot in mouth disease. My buddy and fellow Sergeant, Joe Garbacz, told me to go get the Captain's bags. My response was the Captain could get his own bags! Well our section Master Sergeant advised me that was a "direct order" and failure to follow it was not a very smart thing to do considering I only had about 10 weeks left in Country. I got the Captain's bags.

Late May 1969 we were sent to Quan Loi and set up the HHT 3/11 TOC inside the 1st Air Cav base camp. Well whoever chose the spot for us failed to consider the enemy had that spot zeroed in as only our location was hit while we were there. We immediately began receiving incoming rocket attacks over the next week. The enemy would set up the rockets during the night with time delayed fuses so they went off anytime after day break and as late as into the afternoon. For the past 10 months we had not had anyone in the TOC killed. During that week, my memory was that we had 6 killed (including Daryl Schmidt a 19 year old in my S-2 section) and a dozen wounded from these attacks. Daryl and another trooper were at a water truck filling cans when the rocket hit by them. A buddy and I were in a 3/4 ton truck full of cans and were seconds from being there as well. When the rocket went over I jumped out of the truck and started to crawl under but realized the truck had not stopped rolling. I think of Daryl often and have been to the Wall in DC to remember him. It also became really dangerous to be in a chow line during those days as the rockets often hit during chow time. We eventually moved out to a fire support base and were not attacked again before I left country.

However I remember that our line troops were in constant contact each and every day as the fighting was intense as we were relaying enemy information to regimental (S-2) intelligence almost every radio shift.

Shortly before leaving the field, I was on the radio one night with my counterpart at Regimental S-2 and let him know I would be leaving country soon. He said, "Come up secure." We had radio voice equipment that would scramble our conversation so the enemy could not listen in. I did, we talked for awhile and he wanted me to come by Regiment to see him before I left country. As he was talking, the squadron Colonel and Major came into my track to use our "Secure" equipment as the S-3's was not working. I could not tell my buddy to shut up and had to wait until he was done talking and just said "Roger Out." The Colonel was kind enough to just comment that I was talking with my buddy. Unfortunately I was not able to see him before I left country, nor do I remember his name.

I do not remember the exact day but I was told to get my stuff as a chopper was in-bound to take me back to base camp and that my tour was near its end. Eventually, after a few days at Blackhorse Base Camp, I headed back to Long Bien where those lovely people welcomed us with formations every few hours and being told our haircuts would be checked and if not short enough, we would not get on the plane home. The REMF's had such endearing personalities.

We landed after dark in Oakland for out-processing. They lead us to believe we would be out-processed that night but around Midnight told us to bunk down in a barrack near by. To remind us we were still theirs, a lieutenant came through around 5am, woke us all up to check ID's. Eventually we did get out and headed to the airport and home. Having forgotten about the date change, Mom and Dad had a surprise as I arrived a day sooner than expected.

It all seems so long ago but also so much is still fresh in my memory as I am sure it is for you. We all had some hard times there and lost some friends. But I remember some of the pleasant moments and sometime funny moments. But most of all the experience changed my life in so many positive ways.



SCHOLARSHIP UPDATE

The 11th ACVVC Scholarship Program has awarded 317 scholarships totaling \$967,000 to children of our members and KIAs since its inception in 1997. Every scholarship dollar paid was donated by YOU, the members of this great association of Blackhorse combat veterans!! You will find a usable copy of the current Scholarship Application in this issue of *Thunder Run* on page 26 and also on our website.

Our recently updated **Scholarship Guide** provides more information on the scholarship process and contains detailed assistance on completing the scholarship application. You can print a copy of the Guide and the Application at *www.11thcavnam.com/scholar.html*. If you have a child (natural, step child or adopted) who is planning on attending a college, community college or trade school this fall, please encourage them to apply for a scholarship (undergraduate studies only). Please do not hesitate to contact me with your questions.

Beginning in 2008, each recipient's Scholarship Award has been dedicated to honor a specific 11th Cavalry "Blackhorse" Trooper who was Killed in Action (KIA) in Vietnam or Cambodia. The Blackhorse KIAs to be honored each year will be selected on an impartial and random basis. An attractive certificate suitable for framing containing information about the trooper in whose honor their scholarship is dedicated is sent to each recipient.

In addition, each year, one recipient will be selected to receive a special Colonel Charles Schmidt L. Leadership Scholarship award in honor of former 11ACVVC President Chuck Schmidt for his leadership and devotion to the 11th Cavalry "Blackhorse" Troopers of the Vietnam War. Chuck died on Veterans Day 2007 as a result Agent Orange-related cancer shortly after being elected to his third term as President. Chuck's widow, Mrs. Bonnie Schmidt, will select the recipient of this award from the list of scholarship winners.

Scholarship Judges are asked to rate each applicant on a 30-point system. The point total for a perfect score is 30.

• Up to **7 points** may be awarded for Application completion, legibility, and following the instructions on the form and in the Guide.

• Up to **8 points** may be awarded for Grades of the Applicants' most recent two years of education (high school or college).

• Up to **15 points** may be awarded for the narrative response to the questions in item #11 of the 11th ACVVC Scholarship Application.

Each applicant will be judged independently by *each* Judge. Currently we have five participating independent Judges.

The Judge's scores are averaged to obtain a final score for each applicant.

The 11ACVVC Board of Directors will determine the number of Scholarship awards to be granted in any given year based on the available donated funds and the dollar amount determined for each scholarship award. The Scholarship Committee will then apply that number to the list of applicants in descending score order to determine who will receive the Awards.

In 2012, we were able to award 22 scholarships totaling \$90,000 to children of our members.

Grandchildren of members are not currently eligible. The criterion to include Grandchildren as eligible for scholarships is reviewed annually.

Animals

Do you think about the animals when you reminisce about Viet Nam? "Huh?" you say. "I try to avoid thinking about Viet Nam." C'mon, animals are pleasant and fun to remember. Think about all those pigs and chickens running around peoples' yards and under their houses. We talked before about Margaret the dog and Charlie Chicken. They were great pets. How about the rubber tree flies, the rats, snakes, tigers (tigers? yep), lizards, beetles, ants, water buffalo, little deer, otters, horses (definitely not thoroughbreds), monkeys, mice, and others that I can't remember or others that I only heard rumors about, like elephants. I haven't mentioned the birds and thousands of insects that you probably forgot about anyway.

Today I thought we'd talk about tigers, lizards, rats, and maybe water buffalo. OK? So, were you there along QL14, the highway from Loc Ninh to Bo Duc/Bu Dop, the day our helicopter troopers shot a tiger? I wasn't on the spot at the time because I was somewhere else, but our guys told me all about it. So I went and took a snapshot to remember it by even though I wasn't too happy about the tiger becoming a casualty.

Here's what happened: One fine day during the dry season one of our helicopters was flying around the jungle looking for VC when what did they see instead of VC? You got it. A tiger! Well, I guess our helicopter troopers thought they were on an African safari when they did what any warrior on safari might have done - they shot the tiger. Now what? They couldn't land because they were over the jungle. Then along came one of our ACavs, more mighty warriors on safari. Naturally, they claimed the tiger. However, by this time our helicopter crew had landed and came to claim their trophy. So here are two sets of mighty warriors haggling over the beautiful dead tiger whose pelt was very desirable of being possessed. "So did the squabble get settled?" you might ask. "Yes, it did," I reply. One set of warriors cut off the ears and gave the rest of the

tiger to the other warriors. Then no one wanted the formerly dangerous, but still beautiful, tiger. "So what happened to the tiger?" "I don't know, I just took the picture." Lesson learned - don't shoot tigers unless they're dangerous and you're on safari.

Here's a lizard story which was pretty funny even if our interpreter thought it was a disaster. We were still out along QL14 up by Cambodia. Our Vietnamese interpreter (I'll call him Bao) had caught a huge lizard. For the sake of conversation, we'll call him Lizard. He was very big. Anyway, Bao had Lizard tied by a string to a tree. For Vietnamese, big lizards are delicious delicacies. Bao was saving Lizard for a special occasion. One unhappy day Bao discovered that Lizard had escaped into the jungle. Did Bao find Lizard? Nope. This was the jungle, Lizard's home turf. Bao was inconsolable which didn't matter because Lizard wasn't coming back. He was probably reunited with his family for a lizard celebration (lizebration?). I'm sure Bao remembers, even after all these years.

Here's my second rat story. I told you the first one some time back about rats using my forehead for a crosswalk. That was one night when I was borrowing someone's bunk at Quan Loi. My second rat story happened at Soc Trang during my first tour. We were on a small airfield which had been built by the Japanese during WWII. We had rats, lots of rats. They were big, bigger than at Quan Loi. I guess they ate better at Soc Trang. Hating rats, we did what any normal American would do; we poisoned them, making them dead. Well, that caused a minor uproar from our Vietnamese workers. How did we know they ate rats? Did you know that? I'm sure you didn't. So of course we stopped poisoning the rats and caught them in traps instead. After that, every evening you could see Vietnamese workers happily trotting along, each with a pole across his shoulder and stacks of rat traps tied onto both ends of the pole. Each rat trap contained a live rat - someone's meal for the evening. "Yeccchh!" you're probably saying and I don't blame you. However, look at it this way - its meat. Hey! (or hay!), meat is meat. It didn't seem to hurt them, the Vietnamese, that is. The rat made his (or her) contribution to our Vietnamese workers dinner and we got rid of the rats. It was win-win for everybody except the rats.

Let's discuss water buffalo, which is an interesting animal to discuss. You should tell your family your water buffalo stories, at least the good fun ones. You remember that water buffalo were the Vietnamese tractor for plowing rice paddies, their truck for hauling or towing things like bags of rice, and their car for transporting the boy who rode it to the rice paddies or for herding other water buffalo. It might have been the family pet too, although I can't verify that. I just thought of another use for water buffalo: They were frequently used as a road block. They were very slow and usually walked along the side of the road going from the village to the paddy with the boy on its back. We came driving along one day and there's a herd of water buffalo, at least three or four, in the way. They're blocking the road and we're in a hurry, of course. But we had to cool it while the water buffalo meandered out of our way. The last main use for water buffalo that I can think of is using their horns as decorations. I can't count how many soldiers, including officers, who had water buffalo horns sitting on their desk or hanging on the wall. They bought them in gift shops where enterprising Vietnamese sold them, at the PX in the rear, or on R&R in Bangkok or Manila. Horns made great souvenirs and the water buffalo didn't need them anymore, being deceased. I don't know if Vietnamese ate water buffalo, but I doubt it. Would you eat your tractor?

My last animal story is about sheep. In Bible times people kept sheep mostly for wool and food. There are many sheep stories throughout the Bible. It's clear that sheep are less than self-reliant. They needed a shepherd to keep them on the right path to their pastures and to protect them from wild animals. Sheep herding wasn't a very desirable job but it was necessary. Sheep would wander off, get into trouble, mal memories. What are your animal lose their way, get hurt, and have problems like that if they didn't have a shepherd to take care of them. Also, they would follow almost any other sheep, right or wrong. The main Bible sheep story for this conversation makes the point that people, specifically you and me, are like sheep and

we need a shepherd for our lives. A well known shepherd and sheep story is the 23rd Psalm: "The Lord is my shepherd; I shall not be in want. He makes me lie down in green pastures, he leads me beside still waters, he restores my soul. He guides me in paths of righteousness for his names sake. Even though I walk through the valley of the shadow of death, I will fear no evil, for you are with me, your rod and staff, they comfort me." I get the point. Do you?

That's all the time I have today for animemories?

REUNION REGISTRATION

nother reunion is swiftly approaching and we are looking forward to seeing all of you in Indianapolis. It is my job as the reunion registration director to be sure that you fill out your registration form in such a way that your time spent at the start of reunion is fast and thus enabling you to meet with your friends quicker. So let's get started.

First – Locate the registration form. You can either find one here in the *Thunder Run* (opposite page) or on the web site. Whichever you use is fine with me. If you do choose to use the one out of the Thunder Run, you might want to make a copy of it so that you can preserve your copy of the TR. If you do choose to use it, just be sure to send the entire page. DO NOT TRIM IT!

Second – Send it in as soon as you possibly can. Reason? When you place it in the mail, it first goes to Ollie Pickral in Virginia. He removes and deposits the money and then after he has about 10 of them he sends them to me in Wisconsin. After I receive them, I have to sort them and make name tags for each one and then record it into my files and then put it on the web site. All total this can take anywhere from 2 to 3 weeks. Blackhorse Hoofbeats

Echoes from the Regiment's Service in Vietnam 1966-1972

• The problem with historical records. In the heat of battle, reports go astray, coordinates get copied wrong, and casualty counts become confused. Alpha and Charlie Troops' firefight on 12 July 1968 is a typical example. The after action reports (AAR) from Regiment, the 1st Infantry Division, and II Field Force Vietnam all generally agree that First Squadron was under the operational control (OPCON) of the 1st (US) Infantry Division on 12 July, but there they begin to diverge. The Regimental AAR says the contact lasted seven hours, but the 1st Infantry AAR says it started at 0800 and was over by 0930. The Regimental AAR says that there were 36 friendly casualties, including four killed in action, while the 1st Infantry AAR says only 12 Troopers were wounded and none were killed in action. The enemy "body count" is even more uncertain: according to Regiment, 51 NVA were killed in action – 1st Infantry and II Field Force say there were only 10 enemy soldiers killed. The Regimental AAR reports that 3 NVA were captured, 1st Infantry says one NVA was captured, and Il Field Force says there were no POWs. Who you gonna believe???

• MEDCAP. From the Combat Operations After Action Report for Operation Atlanta (20 October – 8 December 1966): "On 5 December (in conjunction with a cordon and search operation conducted by 3rd Squadron of the villages of CAM MY and BINH DAI) a MEDCAP [medical capabilities assistance visit] plan was initiated. In addition to medical assistance, basic foodstuffs (powdered milk, bulgur wheat, rice, and cooking oil) were distributed to the villagers... It was quite apparent from the outset that the people had been well indoctrinated by the Viet Cong on the dire consequences and effects if any of them should accept medical help from US troops [only 20 of 300 residents accepted medical aid]. The food was received in much the same manner. This was the first time the Blackhorse Regiment has encountered a locale where so many of the people were pro-Viet Cong. In order to counteract this situation an extensive psychological program has been initiated in this area stressing the importance of the people rallying to the cause of the Government of Vietnam."

 Logistician's Nightmare. Until midway through 1967, the enemy had been using the RPG-2 [rocket-propelled grenade]. The United States Military Assistance Command, Vietnam (MACV) Command History for 1967 rated the RPG-2 as "ineffective" against armored vehicles, citing a survey "which showed that out of 194 disabled tracked vehicles, only 16 were damaged by the enemy's use of this weapon." However, beginning in the fall of 1967, the new RPG-7, with an improved warhead, range, and fuse "which provided for instantaneous initiation of the shaped charge and, therefore, optimum penetration of armor" appeared on the battlefield. Blackhorse Troopers could attest to the improved capability of the RPG-7 first hand. Also in 1967, Troopers were seeing fewer and fewer French, German, and British World War II vintage rifles and machineguns on the battlefield and more and more AK-47s, both of Soviet and Chinese Communist origin. How did German rifles come to be in Vietnam, you ask? Simple explanation, actually. When the French reoccupied Indochina after the end of World War II, they equipped their local colonial troops with weapons from captured Nazi arsenals. For example,

over the course of several days in January while on Operation Cedar Falls, Blackhorse Troopers captured two Chinese Communist Type 43 sub-machine guns (7.62mm), one Soviet-made Mosion Nagent rifle (7.62mm), thirteen Chinese Communist Type 53 carbines (7.62mm), one US Model 1917 Springfield rifle (.30 caliber), 9 US M-1 rifles (.30 caliber), one French Lebel rifle (8mm), two German K98 Mauser rifles (8mm), one British Enfield rifle (.303 caliber), one home-made rifle (undetermined caliber), and one US M1911 pistol (.45 caliber) – a logistician's nightmare when it came to supplying ammunition and spare parts. By the end of the year, AKs were the weapons being carried by almost all of the enemy the Regiment encountered. Clearly, the enemy was upgrading his arsenal in preparation for an escalation of the war.

• Dust and Mud. In December 1967, the Regiment had been in Vietnam just over a year and was operating out of the Blackhorse Base Camp under the operational control of the 9th (US) Infantry Division. This was the beginning of the dry season, and dust was a constant issue for the convoys that moved between Long Binh and the Blackhorse Base Camp. During one such convoy along National Highway 2 just at the junction with National Highway 1, an Armored Cavalry Assault Vehicle (ACAV) from Regimental Headquarters Troop found itself nose-to-nose with a civilian bus that suddenly appeared out of a cloud of dust. The 17th Public Information Detachment dispatch tells the rest of the story: "To avoid a collision, the driver SP4 Robert L. Krull swerved his vehicle off the road and onto what he thought was firm ground. It was a marsh which sucked under the front end of the ACAV, causing the vehicle to stand on end, and then topple over. The two gunners on the vehicle were thrown clear, but the driver and track commander were pinned inside. Boxes of ammunition and debris buried [SP4 Gregory] Nettle [the track commander], whose body had been partially thrust into the mud and pinned by his vehicle. Three Vietnamese ran up to the track and began digging out the track commander, while others went to the aid of the driver. During the 20-minute rescue that followed, some 15 Vietnamese civilians working alongside Blackhorse Troopers freed the two men. The rescuers disregarded constant sparks from the vehicle which could have ignited spilled fuel or the rubble of ammunition and explosives tossed from the vehicle."

• **Flying ACAVs**. From the September 1969 edition of the Blackhorse newspaper: "The regiment's assault vehicles not only run the roads and bust jungle, they also fly – if you stuff them inside a large enough cargo plane. On August 18th and 19th the Blackhorse Regiment airlifted an entire ACAV [Armored Cavalry Assault Vehicle] troop 36 miles from An Loc to Bo Duc, a camp only 4 miles from the Cambodian border. The airlift of the 24 ACAV's was the first tactical airlift of an armored cavalry troop ever accomplished by the 11th Cav, but it was no experiment. Regimental Commander Colonel James H. Leach, decided that by the time bridges had been built and roads had been opened between Loc Ninh and Bo Duc, the tactical situation would have made the move useless. The enemy would have had enough warning to make an escape. So Col. Leach requested Air Force C-130's, moved First Squadron's A Troop to the end of the Loc Ninh runway, and had the entire force and all its equipment [minus the

Troop's Sheridans] airlifted to Bo Duc in two days. As soon as the men and machines rolled out of the cargo hold and picked up ammo. they were ready to fight. It was a big job. The Air Force ran 45 sorties, one flight for each of the ACAV's and 21 for the supplies. Each ACAV means a payload of 25,000 pounds. Pilots of the lumbering Hercules cargo planes felt the 12¹/₂ ton load every time they touched down and reversed props at the Bo Duc strip, which had been lengthened in order to meet the Air Force's minimum safety standards. Air Force Mission Commander Major Eugene Askensay of Peoria, III. described the job quite calmly. 'It went real well. The runways were short but reasonably level. My biggest problem was keeping the civilians and their motorbikes off the runways.' Before the ACAV's could be moved, the crews had to strip off the antennas and machine guns, unload the machine gun ammunition, and drain the gas tanks to three guarter full. First Lieutenant William Nash of New Orleans, La., leader of the first platoon, said the operation was, 'surprisingly simple. The biggest thing about it is that we were in contact last night, we airlifted today and tonight we'll be ready to fight again.' A minor discordant note was sounded by Sergeant Larry Dungey of Cassopolis, Mich. He confided, 'I don't much like to fly, and flying around with a 12 ton ACAV doesn't help the situation much.' But he made it, as did all the men in A Troop – who once again showed how far and how fast the 11th

Armored Cavalry Regiment will move to find the enemy and pile on."

 Maintenance Standdown. From the Second Squadron Standdown After Action Report, dated 28 October 1970; "The 2d Squadron, 11th ACR participated in the Regimental standdown program from 13 August through 16 September 1970. This standdown was the first opportunity in over 14 months for the squadron to direct its attention solely towards accomplishing detailed maintenance and establishing the accountability of its equipment without simultaneously attempting to accomplish a combat mission." As part of this standdown, the Squadron maintenance section and vehicle crews replaced 24 major assemblies (engines, transmissions, and final drives) and, after technical inspection, found that 13 of the squadron's M113s met washout criteria and were turned in for replacement vehicles. Further, a "100% inventory of all squadron equipment was conducted by sub-hand receipt holders, and hand receipts were updated. A significant amount of excess property was identified and either turned in or picked up through inventory adjustment procedures." Radio repair was a particular problem during the standdown: "Approximately 90% of the radios turned in for repair were returned with improperly adjusted squelch, and approximately 20% of the repaired radios that were returned were in an inoperable condition."

Our most notable effort was our rotational support for both units preparing to deploy and those executing the Army's Decisive Action rotations. The year's final rotation closed out with the 13-02 DATE which trained the 1st Brigade, 4th Infantry Division out of Fort Carson.

In the month of December, we took the opportunity to conduct training with our U.S. vehicles. We executed Tank, Bradley, mortar and flex-machine-gun live fire training. This opportunity enabled the Troopers to improve their gunnery skills as Delta Troop took the top tank honors and Assassin Troop walked away as the top Bradley Troop. Our top Bradley crew consisted of B-31 with 1LT David Hester (Bradley Commander), SGT Jordan Frizzel (Gunner), and SPC Brandon Ridgeway (Driver) with a score of 951 and 9 of 10 engagements qualified. The Top Tank crew was G-32 with SGT Richard Preston (Tank Commander), SPC Victor Cortez (Gunner), SPC Jeffrey Ruiz (Driver), and PFC Michael Nudo (Loader) with a score of 984 and 10 of 10 engagements qualified.

11th Cavalry Memorial Project

Planning for the relocation of the 11th Cavalry memorial from Fort Knox to the new National Armor and Cavalry Museum at Fort Benning has begun. It is anticipated that the first phase of development of the National Armor and Cavalry Museum will be completed by October 2013. Our goal is to complete the move and construction of the new memorial site no later than early 2015. This gives us approximately two years to complete the project.

The entire memorial complex will be moved, including the large Vietnam Memorial, the three memorials which are dedicated to the Philippine, World War II and Iraqi Freedom campaigns, plus the nearly 1,100 granite bricks which surround the memorial. All bricks will be catalogued prior to the move and will be place in the new location in the same relative position.

The cost of the move will be shared between the 11th Armored Cavalry's Veterans of Vietnam and Cambodia and the Blackhorse Association. To help offset the cost of this project both organization will be offering granite bricks.

Anyone can purchase a memorial brick. Memorial bricks are a lasting tribute of YOUR SERVICE to our regiment. The bricks are a way in which we ALL can participate and show our support for our fellow Blackhorse troopers whose names are listed on the memorials. The bricks measure 8 x 4 x 2 inches and can accommodate inscription of up to three lines of 15 characters per line. Many choose to have their name, unit, and years of service with the regiment inscribed on their brick. Others choose to have a special message inscribed. Some of the message are very touching: "IN OUR HEARTS", "BROTHERS 4-EVER", "I NEVER FORGET" and "ALL GAVE SOME-SOME GAVE ALL" are just a few of the personal messages on the bricks. The cost of the granite bricks is \$100.

We are beginning this fundraiser now so we can insure that sufficient funds are available in plenty of time to complete the project by early 2015. Bricks will be placed at the new memorial site at Fort Benning during the construction phase.
