likely decrease in step with our inevitable loss in membership numbers and their contributions of articles. TR has had a major increase in cost this year and currently runs about \$35,000 to publish and mail. We will be asking everyone to sign up for the electronic version to help reduce that cost. The printed version will still be available.

For the many years we have kept the reunion registration fee at \$100. That is no longer financially feasible. The cost for Food and Beverage, Audio Visual, and function space has increased considerably because of inflation. Beginning with the 2024 reunion in Omaha the registration fees will be determined by the actual costs to hold a reunion. I cannot predict what the prices will be at this time, but we want our events to remain first class and to continue to hold them as long as there are enough of us left to meet.

In the past we have partnered with the Blackhorse Association on many projects and I want to continue to partner with them on projects into the future. We are limited in the time that the 11th ACVVC will be a viable organization. The BHA will outlive us and we need to have them take on more of what we do together and individually. I have had numerous conversations with The President of the BHA and they are committed to work closer together with us also. We are also putting emphasis on continued and closer relationship with the current Regiment at Ft. Irwin. We all share the pride of serving with the 11th Armored Cavalry Regiment and are all Blackhorse Troopers.

Allen Hathaway has done additional research on the 11th Armored Group in Europe during WWII and found additional names to be added to our Memorial in FT. Benning. We are currently engaged with the BHA to fund that update and for future maintenance of the 11th ACR Tank Memorial in Colorado Springs. More to follow on those projects.

I want to also recognize the 11th ACVVC Women's Ladies Group for the work they do. As you may be aware they make prayer shawls for the families of deceased Troopers and Troopers wives. They also contribute to the Scholarship Fund. They enrich our Blackhorse family, and we are fortunate to have them.

Our Secretary, Greg Mason has decided to step away from that responsibility and not to run again after his term expires in 2024. He has done a remarkable job and will be missed. We are taking applications for that position and to chair the Silent Auction. If you think you have the qualifications to perform either of these duties, please contact me or any other officer.

2023 Elections

Three positions will be up for election this year during the General Membership Meeting to be held Saturday morning, September 23rd, during the 2023 Reunion. The three positions are Vice President, Treasurer and one Director.

The Vice President and Treasurer will serve two-year terms beginning January 1, 2024 and ending December 31, 2025. The Director will serve a three-year term beginning January 1, 2024 and ending December 31, 2026.

All candidates must be Life Members of the 11th ACVVC. Candidates will have an equal opportunity to state their qualifications at the General Membership Meeting. The elected candidates must be able to attend the annual reunion and participate in Board Meetings held during their elected term that are generally held by conference call.

The elected candidates must be able to communicate by e-mail with the other

Board members and be able to help the Board make decisions on a variety of organizational matters. Each candidate must be highly organized and be able to commit time and energy to a specific project or committee as directed by the President. Excellent skills in using Microsoft Word and Excel are required in order to prepare reports and other documents required of all positions.

The position of Vice President serves as the President's right hand man. In the absence of the President the Vice President shall perform the duties of and be subject to all restrictions upon the President . Sound leadership skills are fundamental to the position.

Candidates for Treasurer must have verifiable experience in accounting and/or finance. Excellent skills in using Microsoft Excel are required. Most importantly, the Treasurer is accountable for maintaining accurate financial records, preparing reports, budgeting, forecasting, etc., of the General Fund, the organization's investments, and all expenses and obligations incurred from

the various projects supported by the 11th ACVVC.

The Directors are expected to commit themselves to a specific area of interest within the 11th ACVVC or as directed by the President.

Nominations for these positions should be submitted in writing to the Secretary or submitted from the floor at the General Membership meeting. Please consider participating on the Board of Directors serving the 11th ACVVC.

Dunneback & Girls Farm -A Family Tradition-

It all started nearly 100 years ago. Edwin Dunneback purchased the farm in Alpine Township in 1922.

He farmed 170 acres of apples, peaches, corn, hay and a herd of dairy cows. Edwin had four sons & one daughter. Edward & Joseph continued on the farm adding strawberries & the cold storage, now known as our farm market. From the 30's to the-60s, the barn hosted dances, weddings, farm tours, & hay rides. Edward met his wife Helen at one of these dances.! Edward & Helen had 3 children, Pamela, Michael & Suanne. In 1969, the family was forever changed, when our beloved Michael, son, brother, & uncle, was killed in action in the Vietnam War. Ed could not bear seeing"& Sons" on the front of the barn, so Pam climbed up and changed it to "& Girls". The tragedy caused irreparable damage to the family, but they pulled together and continued farming. Suanne moved back to the farm to work with her Dad everyday. She has run the farm for the last 40 years. Suanne, her husband and two daughters, Stephanie & Sarah, now live on the farm working to carry on the family tradition of four generations. We offer "u-pick" asparagus, strawberries, sweet & tart cherries, apples and pumpkins. The same barn houses our fresh produce market, gift shoppe, bakery, kitchen & tap room.

'Hazel' and the Northern Lights

n 'Nam, I became good friends with Norman "Hazel" Lindjord, an LT who was in FDC (Fire Direction Control) in the 3rd Squadron Howitzer Battery after serving as an FO (Forward Observer) in one of the line troops (K Troop I think). He was a great guy and I never heard a bad word about Hazel. His nickname came about because he was very neat and always did his best to keep himself and his area clean - not an easy task in the jungle in a war zone. He actually had a broom and was frequently sweeping out the constant dirt and debris that would settle in the FDC track. Back in the world in the 60's there had been a TV show with a maid named Hazel who was a neat freak...hence Norm's monicker "Hazel."

Hazel was quite a physical specimen, immensely strong, and often engaged in "feats of strength". The "mud run" (photo attached) was a bet he took and won. He also was the champion of tearing the plastic sixpack holders (photo attached) with just the middle fingers...a task which I also performed that left my fingers numb for years. He was pictured in the 2021 calendar in April (photo attached); that's Hazel with the white towel around his neck...always striving to stay neat and clean!

Hazel and I spoke a few times on the phone many years after 'Nam and he attended only one reunion, that being the 2003 reunion in Eugene, Oregon. He lived on Camano Island,

Washington and had become a very wealthy man after 'Nam. He loved gardening and had a spectacular estate where he tended all his flower gardens. He came to Eugene along with Dave Coover (who flew in from Corpus Christi, TX) another LT who was the 3rd Squadron How Bat XO. The three of us spent one great evening in the bar/lounge drinking and recalling some great stories...and some were true!

Anyway, a few years passed and I learned from Jerry "Hog Body" Trainor (a Spc 4 in FDC from Wisconsin) that Hazel was sick...very sick and dying from cancer. I called Hazel in the hospital and talked about flying out to visit him (as Jerry had). He was very upbeat and denied he was that sick and assured me he would be leaving the hospital in a few days...he did so...dying on February 6, 2005.

I was devastated and when I learned of the service details, I flew to SEA/TAC and attended along with Jerry, Dave, Leo Regala and his wife (State Senator Debbie Regala) and Harold "Beau" Mann. We had a great time and spent a long night - maybe too long - at a local restaurant/bar telling more war stories about Hazel.

I had already checked out of the hotel and caught a serious "red-eye" flight back to Philly with a BAC that already had me at 30,000 feet.


I kept in touch with his parents, Hal & Mary and one year when they were visiting friends in New Jersey I met them for dinner at the Grand Cafe in





In the past 36 years of operation, the Board has made financial decisions for us to assure we continue our programs and reunions for our members. The Board in the early 80's made the decision to invest our Life Membership monies into CD's, bonds, mutual funds, etc. The idea was that at some time in our future, we would need these monies to continue our organization in our latter years. While we were placing your membership monies into investments, we relied on donations, Quartermaster store sales and annual memberships to finance our yearly operations.

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A Face to Every Name

ears of work searching for photographs to go with every name inscribed on the Vietnam Veterans Memorial Wall is finally complete.

The project began in 2001 ... and as Tim Tetz, VVFM's Director of Outreach, said "But we never thought we'd find a photo for every name." In August of 2022, they succeeded.

The process has been sort of like solving a jigsaw puzzle piece-by-piece, except there are 58,281 pieces, and each one must be hunted down individually. Most of the photos were assembled by a group of dedicated volunteers. One volunteer, Janna Hoehn, joined the puzzle hunt in 2011 through a series of coincidental events.

"The way that they were treated upon their return has never left me," said Hohm.

The lingering impact led her to visit the Wall. Despite not knowing a single name, Hoehn was amazed at the impact the black granite wall had upon her. On a whim, she decided to do a rubbing of a name chosen at random.

Upon returning home, Hoehn began to research the name. After discovering a photo, but failing to find any family contact, she put the rubbing and picture in a scrap book and forgot about them.

By chance. Hoehn saw a news story in 2011 about the thentitled "Faces Never Forgotten" effort, which sought to match a photo with every name on The Wall. Hoehn immediately thought of her rubbing and the image she saved, and submitted the photo to the VVMF. Not long after, founder and then-President, of the VVMF, Jan Scruggs asked her if she wanted to join the project as a volunteer. Hoehn started with the 42 names from Maui ... and began her search at libraries, were she scoured obituaries and yearbooks.

After 6 months of searching, she had a photo for all the Maui names. [Janna] commissioned a banner that displayed photos of the 42 men from Maui who died in Vietnam and took it around the island. Meeting the families and learning their stories turned into a special experience. "It was a wonderful process," Hoehn said: "I knew I couldn't be done with this."

Hoehn then decided to search for photographs of men from her hometown of Hemet, California, which grew to ... the entire state. As she continued, Hoehn learned the best ways to get the best results was in reaching out to local newspaper ... [as] they were quick to jump on publishing a story on the Wall of Faces photo hunt. [This} led to more families and friends reaching out to her with photos or information.

"About one percent who reached out to me actually stuck with it," Hoehn noted. Those who could handle the painstaking process kept at it, and she wound up with a team of 12 people who shared her interest in trying to solve this mighty puzzle.

One of these volunteers was the widow of a Vietnam veteran

who helped complete Oklahoma's list of names. Another was the wife of a Vietnam veteran who helped finish Arkansas. After these volunteers finished their home state, they wanted to continue to help. They stuck with her and, "Now I've got life-long friends," Hoehn said.

Janna and her team were not the only volunteers, thousands of individuals contributed their efforts, and her story exemplifies the tireless spirit of the many individuals. "There were thousands who contributed photos, maybe a 100 who found more than a few, but volunteers as dedicated as Janna were rare," Tim Tetz said. In the end Hoehn helped finish 28 states.

Veterans of our Blackhorse Regiment and their wives also got involved, as they completed the match of all of our 730 KIAs and posted them on our web site.

When I asked Allen Hathaway, Director of Operation Embrace, about his involvement, he wrote: "The project was so important and certainly makes a difference in how we remember the casualties of Vietnam. An image of the person means so much more than just a name."

"There were thousands of volunteers and organizations who participated in this project. The bulk of the work was spread out among these unnamed volunteers who contacted family members or searched newspapers to find an image of a casualty. I may have found a handful, but as I said the bulk was done by these volunteers. Credit should be given to them."

"We have also done photos of our WW II casualties as well as Operation Iraqi Freedom which was separate from the VVMF project."

But returning to the article in the VVA Veteran, a publication of the Vietnam Veterans of America, we read:

The final photo was discovered on August 5, 2022, by a volunteer who asked to remain anonymous. "When the last photo came in, it was wonderful to see the fruition of all these people's labors come to bear." Tetz said.

The seemingly impossible feat was accomplished, and Hoehn was elated. Her time searching for photos may have concluded. But the memories from her journey will never leave her. She remembers many bittersweet emotional phone calls to ask families for photos and information, and the many amazing people she met along the way.

Even though this major milestone was reached, there is still more work to be down. Unfortunately, some of the photos are not great, and a search for better photos to replace them is underway.

A fond memory

When I was living in Vietnam I occasionally saw young American soldiers milling about as I rode in a pedicab - xe xích lô - to and from school. I only saw them from a distance as they were patrolling the street, and they always looked very statuesque in their uniforms. But at times, I'd see them mingling and eating at restaurants among the Vietnamese, whose sentiment seemed to be like mine - we feel safe with you here.

But I never dared to come up close to them. They were to be respected from afar and not to be touched.

Then the war came to our city, Saigon, in 1975. We fled to America - no, we were saved and brought to America; started a new life.

Many years later, my mom, in her 70s, shared with me this story.

he was working late one day. One of the officers at the office offered to take her home. My mother worked for Military Assistance Command in Vietnam, (MACV) a joint service command of the department of defense for the United States. She was a secretary who helped transcribe reports of events that happened in the field. (That would have been a very interesting story if only I was wise enough to ask).

In the iconic army-green convertible Jeep (quarter ton) he drove her home. As they were approaching the house, they saw children playing in the field along the side of the road. Then more children gathered and looked on. Boldly, they came up to the street, closer and closer to the Jeep. So much so that the driver had to slow down and finally stop because he was afraid he was going to hit one of them.

"As soon as we stopped, the children swarmed up and climbed into the Jeep, all smiling and laughing," my mom recalled. "I was slightly alarmed by the apparent ambush, but when I looked at the driver and saw that he was smiling and giggling, I started to laugh too," she continued. And through her giggles, she added, "they were touching everything, the steering wheel, the blinker thing, and jumping on the back seat, filling the space with laughter - hooting and hollering."

But what she noticed most was how they were touching him. They were curious. They ran their little fingers against his uniform, the patches on his arm, and the front pocket. They touched his face as if he was not from this world; then his cap, so he took it off and placed it on one of the children's head.

She remembered them laughing hardily because it was too big and the cap spun loosely on the child's head. They took turns grabbing the cap from each other to try it on all the while my mom and her driver sat watching them.

The laughter of the children was so heartwarming, but she was more touched by the driver's reaction. She recounted, "I saw his young face, so kind, thật là dễ thương - so lovable. He was patient, not because he felt obligated to appease the children, but because he was truly enjoying being around them." "It was a relief for us," she continued, "A reprieve from the seriousness of our work - there was a war going on after all." Her face turned serious for a moment.

That brief moment of joy where everyone was so happy was imprinted in her mind. I can't remember how her memory was triggered when she shared that with me, but I felt so lucky to have heard that story.

I pictured that scene in my mind. Then I saw another one - with

me in it. I saw myself watching the soldiers from afar with a sense of wonder and admiration, but I was not brave enough to approach them. I like them here, being around. But I was not like the other kids; I didn't run up to them. I couldn't.

I saw the soldiers as my protectors, not as my friends. A friend is someone you can laugh and joke around with. They are warriors, invincible, and serious. They don't have frivolous feelings like being playful and joking around. Or maybe I was afraid that they would disappear if I come near them, like bubbles floating about and if touched, would burst and be gone.

I was so wrong. Yes, they were my guardians, but if I was bold enough, they would have been my friends too. It is not a frivolous thing to laugh and joke around- it's human. It's not a frivolous thing to connect with people. That whimsical encounter brought them relief and unexpected joy and left an indelible mark on my mom's heart.

If I were to guess by the way she told me the story, my mother was not only happy, she was proud. Proud to be with him. Proud to be with a person who is compassionate, gentle, and kind. Proud to be protected by that kind of person. She saw not just a soldier, but a person.

Now, many years have passed. My mom had passed along with all of her memories, except for the few she shared with me. I treasure them all in my own mind. But I'm glad that you'd allow me to share this one with you.

I am more confident now, finally. When I see a person with the Vietnam veteran ribbon, a yellow color background with three red stripes and two green ones on his cap or shirt, I will not look and admire from a distance. I will make up for lost time. Please let me approach you, to thank you and honor you up close. Let me shake your hand and give you a hug.

t is April 10th, 1970, and after spending three months in the jungles of Bo Duc and War Zone C I am in Bien Hoa for a couple of days. Back in civilization again! I received word yesterday that my request to come in from the field to get my pay records straightened out had been granted by Captain Menzel. I got on a chopper about noon and was in Quan Loi twenty minutes later. I reported to the G troop area only to find out I would have very little chance of catching a plane to Bien Hoa that afternoon. Even so, I went to the dusty airfield and waited for several hours but I could not get on a flight and had to spend the night in Quan Loi. There were several guys I knew in the aid station, so I managed to borrow a cot and a clean uniform. I was dead tired and slept like a log.

The next morning, I was able to get on a flight which landed in Bien Hoa at 10 am. I hitched a ride on a jeep to the finance offices only to find out that the 11th Cav records had been moved to Di An! Therefore, I had to spend the day in Bien Hoa. I stayed on the air force base and marveled at the luxury our fly boys enjoyed. I found a beautiful, airconditioned library where I could relax and read. The cleanness, newness and civilized appearance of this base contrasted so greatly with the surroundings I have grown accustomed to in the jungle. I had not left the field since January 17th. I ate dinner in the mess hall where I enjoyed the good chow. The guys stationed here don't appreciate the food, but they have never had to eat what we have to in the field. I enjoyed having real eating utensils and trays to put my food on. There was even real butter and napkins of all things!

Anyway, the next day I got to the finance offices in Di An and collected some back pay. While I was there an amusing incident occurred. Those of us who spent time in the field were, in a way, proud of our ragged and unkempt appearance. Our dirty uniforms, covered in the red dust of Bo Duc or the white dust of War Zone C, showed we came from where the action was. Although I had made myself presentable in my own eyes by obtaining fresh clothing in Quan Loi, an officer at Di An didn't see it that way. While I was in the finance offices, he noticed my unshaven face and called me into his office.

"Soldier, this is a United States Army post and all personnel shave at least once a day." As a matter of fact, I would have shaved that morning had it not been for an irritating skin rash I had developed on the right side of my face and neck. The rash made it impossible for me to shave half of my face, so I didn't try to shave that morning. I pointed out this fact to the captain, but he replied, "you should have shaved the half of your face that doesn't have a rash." How can you respond to that kind of reasoning? I had a good laugh about this after I left his office. War hath no fury like the non-combatant REMF officer, I guess!

Blackhorse Hoofbeats

Echoes from the Regiment's Service in Vietnam 1966-1972

I thought that was normal

James 'Jim' Schaffer was born in 1944 in Brooklyn, NY. His father shipped off to war in Europe 30 days before Jim came into the world. Like many of his generation, Jim was drafted out of college in south Florida in 1968. Jim made it through Infantry Basic at Ft. Benning and Advanced Individual Training at Ft. Lewis, WA. After AIT, Jim was selected for Officer Candidate School. He made his three branch choices and the Big Green Machine sent him to Ft. Sill, OK, for Artillery OCS. Artillery was not one of Jim's three choices.

While at Ft. Sill, Jim volunteered for flight school, motivated because his dad "had volunteered in World War II ... He wanted to go to flight school, but because he had damaged his eyesight during college studying, he was not qualified for flight school. So, I wanted to become a pilot." After completing basic flight training at Ft. Wolters, TX, Jim and his classmates moved to Ft. Rucker, AL. He graduated in April 1969 as a UH1 Huey helicopter-qualified pilot and a 2nd Lieutenant of Artillery.

Jim was assigned to Air Cavalry Troop, 11th Armored Cavalry Regiment, upon arrival in South Vietnam in May. May and June were especially busy for the Blackhorse. As the official after-action report says: "Numerous contacts were made by elements of the 11th Armored Cavalry Regiment during the period of 27 May to 30 June resulting in 335 enemy killed and 18 captured."

One of those contacts was Jim Schaffer's baptism by fire. Air Troop was short one front-seat Cobra pilot at the time, so for his first ten days in country, Jim was on strip alert at Evans Army Air Field at Blackhorse Base Camp. Although not Cobra qualified, Jim recalled in an interview: "I was told to stand by the flight line, and if there was any enemy contact, I was to get into the front of the Cobra and get briefed on the weapons systems on the way to the contact." A resupply convoy was ambushed on Highway 13 (Thunder Road), and Second Field Force called for the Cav. "I was told on the way to the ambush how to use the mini-gun ... I had fired the mini-gun in training at Ft. Rucker, but never in a Cobra." Jim told the pilot that he was concerned he might "kill all the friendlies", but the pilot reassured him that he wouldn't let that happen.

Jim's most significant recollection from that day stuck with him for the rest of his very eventful tour with the Blackhorse. "And we took [ground-to-air] fire, had a few holes in the aircraft. And the rest of my time in Vietnam, I thought that was normal – getting shot at all the time."

After two months flying Hueys in the Lift Platoon, Jim volunteered to fly a scout helicopter. "The Scout Platoon was the most dangerous job in the [Air Cavalry] Troop. You basically were a human target." Blackhorse aero-scouts flew the OH6 Cayuse — officially a Light Observation Helicopter, but known to everyone as a Loach. It was the scouts' job to search an area that was thought to be occupied by Viet

Cong (VC) or North Vietnamese Army (NVA) units. Scouts flew at treetop level or even lower, looking for bunkers, heavily-traveled trails, even individual Ho Chi Minh sandal prints in the dust or mud. It was their mission to "find the bastards". So they flew low and slow. Of course, flying so low and without a whole lot of firepower on board, the Loaches were extremely vulnerable. The bastards usually didn't like being found, because they knew that the Cavalry would "then pile on". So, they tried to knock the scouts out of the sky. With anything and everything they had. AK47s, .51-calibers, and RPGs. Even rocks sometimes.

Eight months into his tour, Jim was flying a first-light visual reconnaissance (VR) out of Quan Loi. He recalls he was flying so low that "I could literally see footprints." January was the middle of the dry season, so there was plenty of Quan Loi red dust to leave footprints in. Jim and his scout observer, Sergeant (SGT) Charles 'Lucky' Hunt, didn't spot any enemy on the morning of 17 January, so they went back out at noon.

In late 1969 and early 1970, the entire Blackhorse Regiment was operating along the Cambodian border under the operational control of the 1st Air Cavalry Division. Late December was a busy time for Air Cav Troop, with aero-scouts initiating two major fights along the border north and west of Loc Ninh on the 24th and 27th. Higher headquarters had warned that enemy forces would likely be infiltrating from their Cambodian sanctuaries, crossing the border to take up pre-attack positions in the rubber plantations surrounding Loc Ninh, An Loc, and Quan Loi. Intelligence indicators were that there would be an attack in the area before the Tet holiday (16 February 1970).

A contemporary newspaper report describes the 27 December fight.

"U.S. tank troops supported by artillery and jets reported killing 72 North Vietnamese infantrymen Saturday [27 December] in a battle near the Cambodian border that broke out six hours after the Viet Cong's Christmas cease fire. No U.S. casualties were reported in the fighting about 83 miles north of Saigon but South Vietnamese units joining the fight lost more than 60 men killed or wounded, field reports said ... The combat, two miles from the Cambodian border, was the heaviest single action in six weeks and shattered the general lull which has settled over most fronts in the first hours after Christmas. Spokesmen said the fighting started when U.S. helicopter crews spotted a North Vietnamese force of about 270 men and opened up with rocket and machine gun fire. Elements of the U.S. 11th Armored Cavalry riding tanks and armored personnel carriers moved in, blazing away at the jungles with help from artillery batteries in nearby fire support bases and low-level strafing runs by Air Force F100 Supersabre jets. The bullets, shells and bombs ripped apart 40 bunkers, spokesmen said."

By mid-January, Blackhorse aero-scouts and electronic sensors

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confirmed the intelligence predictions. Large numbers of VC and NVA soldiers were detected crossing the border and heading in the direction of Loc Ninh and An Loc.

The day before they conducted their visual reconnaissance on the 17th, Troopers from 2nd Squadron had uncovered a large enemy bunker complex eight kilometers northwest of Loc Ninh, so Jim and Lucky knew for sure the bastards were out there. It was their mission to find them.

Just outside the edge of the rubber trees, they spotted fresh footprints on a trail. The footprints ended in a bamboo thicket. After flying around the thicket three times, Jim realized that the bastards were hiding in the bamboo. "The enemy had to be in that thicket", Jim remembered in 2019. "And I approached it one more time, and four or five Viet Cong stepped out from the thicket, and all of them emptied at least two [AK47 rifle] clips into the aircraft ... I was hit immediately, the engine was knocked out. The aircraft was burning ... I began an emergency procedure to try to land safely with the engine off [autorotation]."

Jim had taken five bullets in his left leg and, without knowing it, another bullet in the back. These wounds prevented Jim from executing the autorotation, so the Loach crashed. In flames. Upon impact, the Loach flipped onto its right side – the side the pilot was on. Jim recalled: "My observer, he was in the left seat, so he was hanging up in the air. And he appeared to be dead. And, it's kind of a miracle, 'cause he looked down at me and he thought I was dead."

In a feat of adrenalin-induced superman strength, Jim lifted the burning aircraft just enough to crawl out from inside it. He crawled 50 to 75 feet away from the wreckage - with mini-gun ammo, grenades, and fuel cooking off - into a bamboo thicket to hide. Lying prone, instinctually Jim did three things. He pushed the button on his survival radio that sent out a signal for other pilots to home in on. He pulled out his .38-caliber revolver "and made sure it was loaded." And he laid his survival knife on his chest, just in case.

And then he waited: "I don't know for how long."

The Aero-Rifle Platoon (ARP) was scrambled from Quan Loi. A Huey deposited them in a field of elephant grass as close as it could to the burning wreckage of the Loach. The ARPs deployed, unsure of where the pilot and scout observer were, if they were dead or alive, and if - big IF - if there were still any bad guys in the area.

Lucky Hunt – lucky to be alive, but unlucky because he was burned while exiting the aircraft. He went into shock and was found wandering around. That's what some people do when they go into shock; they get disoriented and sort of wander around. He was also lucky because the ARPs didn't mistake him for a bad guy and shoot him. He was quickly put aboard a helicopter and flown to a nearby evacuation hospital.

"I was gonna make a last stand," Jim recalled in 2019. "I didn't know where the friendlies were, didn't know where the enemies were". From inside his bamboo hideout, Jim saw a line of soldiers moving from left to right in front of him. They were dressed in green and had weapons. They could be friendlies or not-so-friendlies. If the latter, Jim knew that as a wounded prisoner of war, "I would not be treated well." At the last minute, Jim realized they were friendlies. "When I was almost about to fire [my pistol], I recognized the lead figure."

While other ARPs cut down two bamboo poles, SGT Ed Cook and Private First Class Paul Krueger took off their shirts and made a makeshift stretcher for the badly wounded Jim Schaffer. They then carried him to the medevac bird.

Fourteen years later at the dedication of the Three Soldiers Statue, Jim was walking near the apex of The Wall. He noticed a man coming towards him with a Blackhorse patch and wearing a black beret (which only the ARPs were authorized to wear in the 11th Cav). As they got closer, the ARP stopped. It was Paul Krueger. "Paul Krueger called out to me - and he was with Ed Cook. He turned white and said: 'Captain Schaffer, I thought you were dead.'"

A Brief History of Jody, The Original 'Mr Steal Your Girl'

then, in your girl.

Meet Jody. Jody decided to shirk his patriotic duty and stay home while you chose to serve your country. Jody is lying in wait, plotting to steal your girl when you're away. It's easy: Jody will swoop in, console her when she's lonely, then slowly fill your boots simply because he's there and you're not. He's the original "Mr. Steal Your Girl," and he is every soldier's worst nightmare.

Everyone's heard of a Jody: whether you've met one, had a brother come to you for advice about one, or seen one in your favorite military move. "Jarhead's" infamous "Deer Hunter" scene did him the most justice, when Brian Dettman thought his wife had sent him the war classic on VHS, which had instead been taped over with homemade porn featuring her and Jody.

But where did Jody, scourge of the deployed soldier, come from? The U.S. military's use of term dates back to roughly 1939 when it was introduced to the U.S. Army by African-American soldiers during World War II. Originally, "Jody" was "Joe the Grinder," and blues singers used to croon about him — a disreputable man who cuckolds prisoners and soldiers by stealing their wives and girlfriends. While he's Joe simply because it's a common name, the "Grinder" comes from the 19th century slang for sex. Jody literally grinds up on, and

By the end of the war, the name had been shortened to Joe D., then Jody, which stuck. And everyone knew who Jody was. The idea of him even worked its way into cadences.

Ain't no use in going home Jody's got your girl and gone [...] Gonna get a three-day pass Just to kick old Jody's ass.

— U.S. Army marching cadence, circa 1944

Tad Tuleja and Eric A. Eliason, authors "Warrior Ways," explain that Jody permeated military culture after World War II, not just because men were concerned about civilians stealing their women, but because they were keenly aware of their own "waywardness." If a soldier could seek the company of another woman while in theater, there's no reason why his wife or girlfriend couldn't or wouldn't do the same.

"The same soldier who curses Jody one day may on another occasion spout the common saying, 'What happens, stays,'" they write.

It's essentially the military equivalent of "what happens in Vegas, stays in Vegas." And while some soldiers can get away with cheating scot-free, what Jody does happens at home, and — there's no escaping that.

The good news is, at least in most marching cadences, Jodies are far lesser men than service members. So if Jody does steal your girl, you can always kick his ass.

Another revisit with the Pact Act

With a focus especially on hypertension

Hi Black Horse folks. Hypertension (HtN) is a medical condition which affects many individuals. And now, with HtN added to the presumptive list of illnesses due to agent orange exposure, vets may be curious as to how VA will address future claims for this condition. I'll present two scenarios of claims for hypertension, a new claim and one previously denied.

1. A new claim.

A. What I have observed so far from the VA is hypertension ratings will be granted as any presumptive condition will be. However, most hypertension ratings will be non-compensable which results in zero percent. This is still a rating, just no \$\$\$. The rationale is that the condition is "managed" by medication. However, in a rating decision, VA will include the paragraph "a higher rating of 10% is not warranted for hypertensive vascular disease unless the evidence shows:

• A history of diastolic pressure predominately 100 or more and there is a requirement for continuous medication for control, or:

- Diastolic pressure predominantly 100 or more; or
- · Systolic pressure predominantly 160 or more"

2. Previously denied hypertension claim

B. A claim previously denied - Now a vet can "reopen" that denied claim. The new approach is to submit a Supplemental claim (VA form, 20-0995 Decision Review Request, Supplemental Claim) with new evidence, the new evidence being the new Pact Act law. The claim will be granted but the date will be the date of the Pact Act which is August 10, 2022. As Mentioned previously (1st Qtr. Thunder Run) hypertension will not be treated as a Nehmer case such as coronary heart disease or lung cancer.

My advice - any Nam vet who has been diagnosed with hypertension, submit the claim. Even if you are rated at zero percent, you will still be service connected!

Tucker (56), and the Honorary Regimental Command Sergeant, Sergeant Major of the Army (Ret.) Kenneth O. Preston. The Command Team also visited the Arlington National Cemetery to mark the 122nd Anniversary of the Blackhorse with a wreath laying at the Tomb of the Unknown Soldiers. Following the theme of tradition, the leadership had a dinner with Blackhorse Veterans and the following day the Command Teams visited Fort Meyer, Virginia and the 3rd Infantry Regiment (The Old Guard).

We then started back into our combat rotations. Rotation 23-04 was a "battle in the box" where the Regiment divided into two forces and fought one another. Over top of the rotation was 3rd Infantry Division, which served as a U.S. Division arriving in Atropia, which was under attack by Donovian forces. For six days the two Brigade Tactical Groups (BTG) tangled and gave no quarter to each other. The Regiment then executed a compressed recovery and combat power regeneration to confront 2nd Armored Brigade Combat Team, 3rd Infantry Division in Rotation 23-05... the first brigade to complete the Army's new modernization program. The Blackhorse Troopers gave them all they could handle. Following, the conclusion of that fight, much of the Regiment recharged during opportunity leave week and then began building combat power for Rotation 23-06, against 3rd Armored Brigade

The Blackhorse Regiment continues to uphold its reputation as a lethal and professional Opposing Force (OPFOR). We are also preparing for several events to continue building unit cohesion and celebrate this fantastic organization. First, the Regiment will host a Spouses Spur Ride on May 13, 2023, and then a Regimental Ball in Las Vegas on May 20, 2023. It is open to Blackhorse Veterans as well, so if you are able, we hope to see you there and toast one another and celebrate 122 years of honorable service to our nation.

accounted for by the Treasurer. The Treasurer shall include the Assistance Fund as a separate reporting item on the quarterly financial report. The Treasurer shall dispense funds from this account as directed by the Officers and Directors of the 11th ACVVC.

Rules of Acceptance: To be accepted for consideration for assistance, the Trooper or the KIA's immediate family members (defined as Parents, siblings, children, widows and grandchildren) requesting financial assistance to attend a Reunion of the 11th ACVVC, must:

1. Do so in writing to the Secretary or the President, and

2. Provide evidence of the Trooper's service in Vietnam and/or Cambodia with the 11th Armored Cavalry "Blackhorse" Regiment.

The applicant Trooper or KIA survivor should describe his/her need for monetary assistance, briefly stating his/her financial situation (i.e., job, income, family, or other relevant facts). In addition, the Trooper may be required to show proof that he is a member, or that he is qualified to become a member, of the 11th ACVVC.

Recipients will only be allowed this assistance one time. Exceptions to the one time only use of the Reunion Assistance Fund will be addressed on a case-by-case

basis by the President and the Treasurer.

Exceptions to the "one time only" rule will rarely be granted and will never be allowed in consecutive years.

The President of 11th ACVVC will decide whom and how much assistance will be given to a Trooper or Survivor of a KIA. The President and Treasurer shall not divulge the names of those assisted Troopers to anyone other than another current Officers and/or Directors.

The Secretary and President will maintain a listing of those who have been assisted and will pass on to their successors.

Let it be known, that a tear was shed, a hug was in vogue, a slap on the back echoed above the trees, an escorted delegation descended the stairs and a wreath was placed with solemnity and an honorable tradition continues until the last one of us stops breathing. Allons. [Blackhorse Riders]


