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

Five positions will be up for election this year during the General Membership Meeting held on Saturday morning at the 2013 Reunion. Here Comes My Replacement

It was April 16th 1969 and I was about to land at a “Fire Base Holiday Inn” in Vietnam. Two weeks earlier I had arrived at Cam Ranh Bay to be processed in and received two weeks of so called “Jungle Training.” I thought, this place is not too bad, it looked somewhat stateside. When I left Fort Lewis a couple of days earlier it had been rainy and about 38 degrees. When I landed in Cam Ranh Bay and got off the plane, that tropical air hit me like a ton of bricks; it was well over 100°. I’ve always thought that part of the two weeks of jungle training was to get used to the climate. From Cam Ranh Bay I went to Ben Hoa airfield, to meet up with my unit, the 11th ACR. I had no idea what to expect. I came in a Chinook chopper with some other soldiers not knowing what units they were going to; the ride took a long time, and the chopper was noisy. When I got off the chopper it was a big change from Cam Rhan Bay, everybody was running around in combat gear with live ammo and M-16 rifles, I thought

man this is really it, I said to myself, I guess this is as bad as it gets, not so. The 11th ACR liaison told me, “You will be going to your unit tomorrow, How Battery, 3/11 at Fire Base Holiday Inn.” Although he never said “fire base,” he just said Holiday Inn and I was the only one going tomorrow. The next morning I left in a Huey chopper, my first ride of many to come.

Now back to where my story began, landing at fire base Holiday Inn. It was 10 am or so and when we were coming in, what I could see below was scary, these M109 tracks and small tents and dust and people running around and someone half naked sitting on a make shift latrine. I thought to myself “I’m going down there?” Finally the chopper landed and the gunner told me to “get out newbie.” It was my first quick jump out of a Huey chopper. There I was, with my two duffle bags of

clothes and gear and my nice clean, new jungle fatigues. There were a couple of Blackhorse troopers there to greet me. Their uniforms looked nothing like mine, they were worn and dusty, and the guys looked mean and serious. I heard someone say in the background, “Here comes my replacement.” The two soldiers took me to my section to meet my section sergeant and my comrades. After meeting the Assistant Section Chief (which by the way, my section was the maintenance section - I was a track and wheel mechanic) one of the troopers kind of took interest in me and came up and said, “Hi, I am Ken Sunderman, I am the Tams clerk, you will be working with me and I will show you around for a while”. Little did I know that we would become very close friends. We are still very close friends to this day, some 43 years later. It is hard to explain how close you come to your buddies in combat, looking out for each other, and how you would do almost anything to guard one another. It is like no other bond in life and only another soldier would understand.

The first couple of weeks I was trying to adjust to this kind of life and with help from my friend it was coming along. One night in late April or May we got word that there was about 300 Viet Cong forming up outside our perimeter who might try to overrun us. I was told to man our section ACAV’s M-60 machine gun across from Ken Sunderman. I had no training on the M-60, but got a crash course on how to operate it from Kenny. It seemed like we always had a company or two of infantry around us most of the time, because they needed us and we needed them. I remember an Infantry Lieutenant coming up to our track and saying anything on that side is not friendly and if they came this way to protect ourselves and open up. As a soldier you always think about things like this and if will ever happen to you. You hope you will not panic and do the right thing. You react by instinct when the fire fight begins. They did come in on us and the outcome for them was disastrous. I felt really bad after the fight but was glad to experience the bad stuff early so I would know what to expect if it happened again. I had some scary moments during the rest of my tour, but nothing like that.

I received a total of 19 scholarship applications by the May 15th deadline this year. That is 4 more applications than I received last year. All of the applicants are children of our members. 12 applicants are female and 7 are male. The youngest applicant is 17 years of age and the oldest is in her 40's. Most of these students fall into the "traditional" college age bracket (18-24 years of age). The applications come from 13 different States with the most from Illinois (4). These students are majoring in a variety of disciplines including: Engineering, Nursing, Biology, Medicine, Accounting, Psychology, and Law Enforcement.

The 11th ACVVC Board of Directors was pleased to be able to award scholarships to all of these deserving applicants this year. Their names and photos will appear in upcoming issues of Thunder Run.

In the past, one of the eligibility requirements of our scholarship program was the requirement that applicants be enrolled in an undergraduate college program. The Thread That Binds Us

In 1990 while getting some counseling at the Vet Center in Minneapolis, MN, I noticed a sheet of paper on the bulletin board with our Blackhorse patch on it. On the bottom of the page was a phone number that you could tear off and call to get information. Ben Hotchkiss was responsible for placing the contact info at the Vet Center. I tore off the number and put it in my wallet and left.

Many times of the course of the next few months I looked at the phone number in my wallet and wondered what would happen if I called. Would there be someone I could relate to? The apprehension was big time and it was a tough place to get beyond. I almost threw the phone number away several times. Finally I did it! I talked to Ben Hotchkiss who was a B Trooper. I was an A Trooper. I could relate to him. He said that the next week there was going to be a reunion of the 11th ACVVC in Sacramento, California and invited me to come. I was unable to do that at the time because of the short notice. In my mind there were still a lot of doubts as to how this was going to feel. That is, reopening the filing cabinet in my mind that had been locked since 1970 which was entitled "My Viet Nam Experience." Thank goodness for guys in our organization like Ben, Allan, Ollie, Pete and so many more. My first reunion in Philly in 1991 convinced me that I needed this organization. I was able to come to a new state of awareness for myself and over the next many reunions and two decades I was able to help others in the same way.


In 1991 on my first trip to The Wall, I was confronted with the fact of how lucky I was to be alive. Thank you to John Hein for being there with me for the support that I received that day. In reading the names and dealing with the initial confusion of who and what I remembered, I was struck by the incredible power of The Wall. I acknowledged to my God how lucky I was and pledged to him to do my best to heal myself and to help others. I registered for the In Touch Service.

The In Touch Service was an independent service where you placed your name and try to get in touch with someone else who had a common bond with someone listed on

the Wall. About a month after the reunion, while I was at work, my wife got a call from a woman who was very excited to have found my name through the In Touch Service and wanted me to contact her right away. Her name was Aunt Honey and she was a German woman. In 1961, her sister, through a relationship, had a child by Sgt. Harry Burton while he was stationed in Germany. Sgt. Burton was my platoon sergeant and was killed in action along with six other Alpha troopers on April 13, 1969. The Army would never release any information to these individuals because they were beyond normal protocol. From this relationship with Sgt. Harry Burton, the woman gave birth to Peter Stark in 1962. Peter's mother never told him who his real father really was until Peter was 24 years old. In 1991 Peter and I began to correspond through the In Touch Service. He wanted to know about his father, Platoon Sgt. Harry Burton. I was able to tell him in my first 13 page letter that Harry Burton was one of those soldiers that exemplified the meaning of being a good man & great soldier. Over the past 20 years we have written letters, talked on the phone and exchanged hundreds of emails. I was responsible for Peter and his family attending the Blackhorse Association Reunion in Fulda 2003 as a Guest of Honor. I passed the information about Peter Stark to Alpha Troopers and Glenn Snodgrass who was our Executive Officer on April 13, 1969. Glenn was also the President of the Blackhorse Association at the time. Glenn saw to it that Peter Stark was properly honored as being Harry's son and acknowledged as one of our Blackhorse family.



When planning our family trip recently to Italy to see my son, SSgt. John Sorich who is stationed in northern Italy in Vicenza, I asked Peter if he could possibly meet us. He and his family made the drive from his home in Munich, Germany to Bassano, Italy where we met Peter, his wife Buffy, Sissi their daughter & Lara the family pup.

There is no greater honor we owe the families of our lost friends that were killed in Viet Nam than to let the families know that the faces of their loved ones are with us every day. I told Peter that I would love to be invited to his daughter's wedding someday (whenever that may be). Peter said that when we were together, he though his Dad was also with us.

A Day in Cambodia

In May 1 of 1970 the 11th Armored Cav spearheaded the invasion of Cambodia. It took 3 days to reach and capture the city of Snoul. After that the 2nd Squadron went on to recon other areas and we had a number of contacts with the NVA in the way of ambushes and firefights. About ten days later one incident stands out in my memory; G troop was doing recon along an old logging road. All three platoons went in different directions which was the norm. 2nd platoon was on a fairly well maintained and large road. It had been very uneventful for a few days so we stopped for some C's and a break, setting up in our usual defensive formation. We were almost done with our lunch when two NVA crossed the road pushing a bicycle no more than 50 yards from our position. They were making no attempt to hide from us. In fact it seemed as if they wanted to be seen.

Someone managed to put a few 50 rounds in their general direction with no damage to them or the bicycle. We were on the move and in pursuit in a matter of minutes. When we got to spot where we saw the two "gooks" they were long gone. The only thing we found were tracks going into the jungle. We continued on down the road a way in hopes of finding something when we heard a firefight breakout behind us in the general direction of the 3rd platoon's location.

We made a hasty about face and sped back the way we had just come. When we got to the place where we had seen the two NVA cross the road we came under heavy fire. Normally this would result in us stopping and engaging for as long as it took to either repel the attack or go on line and charge. But this time the call on the radio was just the opposite. Our orders were "don't stop!.. don't stop! We blew through the ambush with our guns on full auto and getting plenty of fire in return (the antenna on our track was splintered by an all too close AK round). That order and our speedy hookup with 3rd platoon turned out to be crucial.

We made left turn off the larger road onto a less used two rut cut through the jungle and headed toward the sounds of the firefight in which the 3rd platoon was

engaged. As we came closer I could see why we were told to keep moving out of the ambush we had just blown through. In the middle of that small road an ACAV was on fire and a heavy firefight was underway. 2nd platoon herringboned behind the burning ACAV and joined the fight. And it was a good one!

The NVA had picked a place that gave them good lanes of fire for their RPG teams and were launching them freely along with lots of AK fire. Both platoons were engaged for what seemed a life time or it may have been just a few minutes. I don't know how long we were actually in that firefight but it was long enough for us to call in an air strike from an F4 Phantom and for all the ammo on the burning ACAV to cook off. The air strike was close enough for all of us to be pelted with debris from the exploding bombs and the burning track close enough to spray even more.

We had chased the NVA for two weeks. On this day they stopped and regrouped. It had become very plain that the "gooks" were doing their best to keep the 1st and 2nd platoons separated and detained so they could do maximum damage to the 3rd. Due to some astute leadership and very brave troopers the 2nd platoon was able to reinforce the 3rd and turn what could have been a very bad day for us into an "a** whooping" for the enemy.

I later learned that farther down that same two rut cut, one of our tank companies lost two men. Further evidence of the intentions and strength of the enemy on that day.

She looked it over, nodded her understanding, and that's the last time we discussed it. I hope she doesn't hear about my journey there for many more years to come.


CORRECTION

'FOOD'

How about those eggs with baby chicks inside? “Whoa, wait a minute, Chaplain,” you say. “I never tried those. Why would anyone want to eat an unhatched baby chick?” I don't know. The Vietnamese seemed to like them the same way we liked hot dogs.

There are few things in life more important than food. “Hay (or Hey) Chaplain,” you say. “Don't you think that's pretty obvious? What's your point?” My point is that food, besides being important, is also a fun and interesting thing to talk about which we all do. For example, what's the most effective food control plan you know? It's doing *push-aways*, of course (push-away from the table). Since most of us in this discussion are Viet Nam vets, with some friends and families present, let's talk about food in Viet Nam.

Whaaaaat? Viet Nam? Sure, why not? Maybe your family and friends would like to hear about it. I know you ate food over there, starting with C Rations, of course. Who can forget Cs? Actually, they weren't so bad. Some, like fruit cocktail, peaches, spaghetti, and pound cake were very popular. Some others were pretty awful, according to troopers I knew. So tell your own story about C Rats.

In armored cavalry, besides Cs, we sometimes had hot chow, even in the field. Each of our recon troops had a cook (called Cookie) who whipped up a hot breakfast – eggs, SOS, and such. Of course, not when there was something more important happening, like ducking incoming or shooting at someone who was shooting at you. Often at first light, the crack of dawn, Cookie would be firing up his field Coleman stove to fry your eggs. I seem to remember bacon once in a while too. If it was a little greasy no one complained.

Moving along in the food department, I hope you remember rice bread. Mama-

sans and baby-sans sold it out of the round straw trays they carried on their heads. Wherever we stopped they showed up selling things. The rice bread was those little loaves (not loafs) that you liked for snacks. They were tasty. They must have been since troopers would be chewing on them any time day or night. I don't recall that many of you carried money in your pockets. I do recall that you had Cs to trade, like ham and eggs which hardly anyone would eat anyway. Also the S-pack Hershey chocolate bars that were dry and tasted like chocolate straw. Not many liked them. I don't know if the Vietnamese liked them but they traded rice loaves for our S-pack chocolate bars. (My recall isn't total but it seems OK now, at least about this subject.)

Let's talk about LRRP (lurp) rations for a minute. They came later during my time in Viet Nam. I don't know if you had any. They were those freeze-dried meals, mostly chili and beans, where you added water, swished it around for a minute, set it on something hot like an ACAV or tank engine for a while and then you had a hot meal. Our guys liked them better than Cs. I liked them too except the beans were always too crunchy, probably from not soaking in water long enough. I could've gotten tired of LRRPs like I got tired of Cs except that I left and went to Germany where we didn't have any LRRPs. I could be mistaken on some of this as my recall is somewhat faulty about LRRPs. So, if you were there and know better, feel free to correct me.

How about those eggs with baby chicks inside? “Whoa, wait a minute, Chaplain,” you say. “I never tried those. Why would

anyone want to eat an unhatched baby chick?” I don't know. The Vietnamese seemed to like them the same way we liked hot dogs. One day I watched a mama-san bring out a whole basket of eggs which looked like regular hard boiled eggs. But they weren't. Kids would take one, peel the shell and there would be a baby chick, feathers, feet, beak, and all. The kids would eat them just like we would eat hard boiled eggs. I guess they were cooked but I don't know for sure. Strange? I think so. I didn't eat any. I wasn't even tempted. Were you?

The subject of food continues — it's a long subject, but usually a pleasant one. So, moving a little further along, I remind you of Care packages. Remember Care packages? Did you get any? I hope so. Stars and Stripes once ran a cartoon where Beetle Bailey wrote home and said, “Thanks, mom, for the cookies. The one I had was fine.” (Beetle's buddies ate the rest). That's very funny. I was single at the time because I didn't have a wife. But I had a great mother, God rest her soul. She sent me Care packages pretty often. I especially liked it when she sent chocolate chip cookies with nuts. They were to die for (bad expression, given where we were). They were awesome even if they were mostly crumbs by the time I got them. I didn't care. I even enjoyed the Christmas fruit cake she sent that came in March. It was covered with mold. So what? I just scraped the mold off. Any fruit cake remaining was truly delicious. It was just great to get food (or anything else) from home.

Candy comes next. Everyone loves *Candy*. Candy tasted good and we had plenty of it. Now my recall begins to fade again, so help me out. Where did all that candy come from? Some came in the S-packs and C rations. Some came in Care packages from home. Where did the rest come from? Who knows? Do you? At any rate, we had plenty. Every Vietnamese, Cambodian, and Montagnard kid everywhere we went knew that GIs had candy

and they would get some. It was offensive and wrong how the media called troopers rotten names in those days. The kids knew you were OK. They knew you were friendly candy-givers. (That's one of my best clear memories).

We all have enough food stories to write a book. Think about your own food memories from Viet Nam. Use my ramblings to start your own recall, which may be more clear than mine. Here's my last food story. It's a spiritual food story. Now, don't pucker up or nod off. This is a positive and interesting food story. As you might guess, it comes from the Holy Bible which is the Word of God. (If there's anyone's word we should want to hear, it's God's). This comes from the fourth book in the New Testament, John 6:46-51, "No one has seen the Father except the one who is from God; only he has seen the Father. I tell you the truth; he who believes has everlasting life. I am the

bread of life. Your forefathers ate the manna in the desert, yet they died. But here is the bread that comes down from heaven, which a man may eat and not die. I am the living bread that came down from heaven."

It's not hard to see that Jesus was talking about himself so I won't explain. I'll just point out that anyone can comprehend that our bodies need food to survive. No argument there that I can see. Furthermore, I don't have trouble seeing that our souls also need food, spiritual food, to survive and thrive in a similar way. Our soul is our actual self. It's our part that keeps on living when our physical body is dead and gone. Compende? Yes? Good.

This is the end. So go have a snack, something good, which isn't Hershey straw chocolate. While you're at it, have a spiritual snack too. Read your Bible. If you don't have one, go on over to Wal-Mart. They have plenty.

Blackhorse Hoofbeats

Echoes from the Regiment's Service in Vietnam 1966-1972

Initial Lessons Learned. Just about one month after arriving in country, Blackhorse Troopers were on their first combat operations. As they operated for the first time in Vietnam, these Troopers found that the weather, terrain, and enemy tactics were both unfamiliar and challenging. This late 1966 report from Third Squadron sums up the experiences of those initial months in country: "Major problems encountered during the first day [of Operation Hickory] were difficulties in land navigation; lack of adequate road nets in the area; and impassable terrain. Some of the problems with the terrain resulted from inexperience with the area and inability to adequately judge the trafficability of the ground... Occasional thunder showers during the day added to the problems of extracting mired vehicles. The Squadron began making its own roads with bulldozers, tanks and ACAV's to increase its access to certain areas... In one case, it took three days to recover a tank which had sunk up to the turret."

Blackhorse LRRPs. By the end of April 1967, the Air Cavalry Troop's Long Range Reconnaissance Platoon, first established in March, had been conducting operations for about a full month. The following observation was made in the Regiment's official after action report for that period: "The employment of the Long Range Reconnaissance Patrols (LRRP) requires that certain assets of the regiment be made available to adequately support this type of operation. During hours of darkness, extraction of the LRRP is, under the best of circumstances, extremely difficult and hazardous. Terrain features (dense jungle and tall rubber trees) in many instances prohibit extraction by air. In order to adequately support this type of unit the following steps must be taken prior to each operation: (1) Aircraft required to support the operation must be placed on immediate standby alert. (2) Coordination must be made with the ground reaction force as to location and movement of the patrol. (3) Artillery concentrations must be plotted and at least two guns on target at all times."

Sheridan Baptism-by-Fire. During early 1969, the Regiment began to receive its first M-551 Sheridans. A fight south of Long Binh Post on February 23rd was the Sheridan's baptism-by-fire, matching First Squadron's Alpha and Bravo Troops (along with a mechanized infantry company) against two Viet Cong companies – the sapper company and heavy weapons companies of the K3 Battalion, 274th Regiment, and 5th VC Division. About 9:30 in the morning, the Long Binh Post perimeter guards – members of the 720th Military Police Battalion – saw six Viet Cong moving into dug-in positions outside the wire. When they engaged them, the heavy return fire told the MPs it was time to call in the cavalry. Arriving on the scene, Bravo Troop's Platoon Sergeant Donald Kelly – who had only recently traded in his Armored Cavalry

Assault Vehicle (ACAV) for one of the new Sheridans – saw that the enemy force was about to overwhelm the out-numbered and out-gunned MPs. PSG Kelly's Silver Star citation tells the rest of the story. "The vehicles [of A and B Troop] were brought on line and the troop assaulted the well-fortified positions. Sergeant Kelly surged slightly ahead of the other [Sheridan] tanks, passed the first position, and assaulted the second trench line, approximately forty meters long. Driving over the trench, he fired his fifty-caliber machine gun at point-blank range but still received intense automatic weapons fire and several grenades which bounced off the Sheridan tank. Realizing the immediate danger, he ordered a canister round to be fired into the hostile soldiers, instantly killing fifteen." Shortly thereafter, the enemy broke contact, leaving 55 of their comrades dead on the battlefield, along with one wounded VC who was captured. The timely arrival of Alpha and Bravo Troops – and their newly-acquired 152mm canister rounds – prevented the enemy from penetrating into the Long Binh Post and setting off the hundreds of thousands of tons of ammunition in the storage area.

Quan Loi Remembered. From the July 1969 edition of the Blackhorse Newspaper: "Thinking of a pleasant, quiet vacation away from it all? If you are, plan your next vacation holiday in scenic Quan Loi. Nested high atop a gentle hill overlooking picturesque rubber plantations this old, former French resort area offers our man in green a variety of pleasures. Dine in one of the many mess tents nestled under the giant rubber trees, or if nightlife is your fancy, try an evening in one of the many bunkers which dot the edges of old Quan Loi. For the hearty outdoorsman Quan Loi is ideally tailored. Get that rustic feeling as you watch the red dust settle upon your fresh uniform. The sports minded will want to be at Quan Loi at noontime or around midnight. According to tradition native Quan Loians spend those hours having spirited low-crawl races to nearby bunkers spurred on by the cheery whistle of 107mm rockets. If aviation is your bag you may want the thrill of riding in one of the many Caribous or C-130s that fly from Quan Loi International Air Terminal. Frequently the natives are waiting to give the passengers an extra pageant of color as they lay fireworks breathtakingly close to your aircraft. Big game hunting at Quan Loi is something not to be missed. It's a simple matter to join a big game safari, known to native Quan Loians as an 'AP' [Ambush Patrol]. Thrills of a life time await the adventurous hunter. One word of caution however, experienced big game hunters never trust native Quan Loians as their gun bearers. For fun in the sun this vacation tell your travel agent to 'make mine Quan Loi.'"

Combat Medical Badge. From the March 1970 edition of the Blackhorse Newspaper: "The 37th Medical Company has been awarded the Combat Medical Streamer (First Award). Sixty-five

percent of the TOE [Table of Organization & Equipment] strength of the 37th Med has been awarded the Combat Medical Badge thus qualifying the company for the award."

Working with the Ruff-Puffs. From the September 1970 edition of the *Blackhorse Newspaper*: "They have been raised in this area and they know what to look for.' The speaker was Captain George K. Crocker, the F Troop commander, and he was referring to the Vietnamese Regional Forces [RF] soldiers who have been engaging in joint operations with the 2nd Squadron troopers in the Chau Thanh and Tan Uyen Districts, 13 miles north of Bien Hoa. Regional Forces companies have been riding on Blackhorse ACAVs [Armored Cavalry Assault Vehicles] on reconnaissance missions. In dense jungle, the Vietnamese soldiers dismount from the vehicles in search of the Viet Cong, their supplies, and bunkers. The RF companies remain under the direct control of the province chief and must stay within the borders of their province. Each night the Vietnamese soldiers returned to province hamlet

and road security. The joint operations had at least one unexpected dividend for one person, Nguyen Van Kiem, chief Kit Carson Scout for 2nd Squadron. 'I've had a chance to meet many of my old friends during the operations,' he said. In addition to giving 2nd Squadron troopers the benefit of a native's knowledge of the area, the joint operations help speed the process of Vietnamization. Says Capt. Crocker: 'The Vietnamese soldier is now going into areas where he has feared to go and he's finding out that they are not as bad as the legends said.'"

Stand-Down. From the 11th Armored Cavalry Regiment Redeployment After Action Report, dated 5 March 1971: "Much time was saved by prewashing vehicles at Di An before moving them to Long Binh [for turn-in]... Two wash points were established at Di An and one fire truck was also used for prewashing. Fire fighting foam at the fire house was found to be an excellent cleaning compound, especially for use in hard-to-clean engine compartments."

11th Cavalry Memorial Project

Planning for the relocation of the 11th Cavalry memorial from Fort Knox to the new National Armor and Cavalry Museum at Fort Benning has begun. It is anticipated that the first phase of development of the National Armor and Cavalry Museum will be completed by October 2013. Our goal is to complete the move and construction of the new memorial site no later than early 2015. This gives us approximately two years to complete the project.

The entire memorial complex will be moved, including the large Vietnam Memorial, the three memorials which are dedicated to the Philippine, World War II and Iraqi Freedom campaigns, plus the nearly 1,100 granite bricks which surround the memorial. All bricks will be catalogued prior to the move and will be placed

in the new location in the same relative position.

The cost of the move will be shared between the 11th Armored Cavalry's Veterans of Vietnam and Cambodia and the Blackhorse Association. To help offset the cost of this project both organizations will be offering granite bricks.

Anyone can purchase a memorial brick. Memorial bricks are a lasting tribute of **YOUR SERVICE** to our regiment. The bricks are a way in which we ALL can participate and show our support for our fellow Blackhorse troopers whose names are listed on the memorials. The bricks measure 8 x 4 x 2 inches and can accommodate inscription of up to three lines of 15 characters per line. Many choose to have their name, unit, and years of service

with the regiment inscribed on their brick. Others choose to have a special message inscribed. Some of the messages are very touching. "IN OUR HEARTS", "BROTHERS 4-EVER", "I NEVER FORGET" and "ALL GAVE SOME-SOME GAVE ALL" are just a few of the personal messages on the bricks. The cost of the granite bricks is \$100.

We are beginning this fundraiser now so we can insure that sufficient funds are available in plenty of time to complete the project by early 2015. Bricks will be placed at the new memorial site at Fort Benning during the construction phase.



Cobb (later known as the Christian General) could have pulled off this whirlwind, never-tried organization, training, and deployment exercise.

At first our troop had only two officers and a few NCOs' to guide this wild assembly of new recruits. Three hours sleep a night was common. Thankfully before long we began to fill up with Officers and NCOs'. Troop Commander CPT Glen Thorson (Retired Colonel and later Professor) – the finest CO that I witnessed during my many years of Army service, along with four officers and 86 Enlisted men thrown together at record pace went on short leave with orders to assemble later in California for deployment. Mercy! Wonder how many would show up? Every d**n one! Thumbing their noses and various other parts of the hand to peace sign waving hippies along the way.

As old troopers are prone to do, I will try to avoid the B.S. by combat stories and how they were perfect soldiers. We had minor, non-reportable diversions common amongst American troopers, who delighted in putting grey hair on their First Sergeant's noggin. Such as unauthorized jeep rides or a surprise supply truck breakdown for a night on the town in Saigon, firefly fights at midnight, flying UFO's, getting Sam the monkey drunk on cheap beer just to watch him wreck the CO's hooch and conducting solemn serv-

Often I experience periods of sadness when it comes necessary to correct the Troop Roster for one who has marched on to meet the Great Commander-in-Chief. Thankfully, the sadness mellows as families of those enjoying Fiddler's Green write or call with questions, comments, or a thank you for remembering.

This Christmas, I was happy as a kid waiting for Santa Claus as I overloaded the

mail carrier with cards for this Special Band of Troopers. Best of all was receiving their cards, letters, photos of them and their families, telephone calls and numerous other reminders. Dang-gum-it! It was a great Christmas even my wife is correct in stating "Your boys are getting old." Without troopers exchanging information on other troopers they have located, the Christmas card reunion would have fallen short. A great help in locating everyone has been Allen Hathaway, President of the 11th ACVVC, who always responds in a courteous and professional manner like he did years ago as a young Officer in RVN, and Fred Ayers, retired Troop "G" Veteran who with bulldog determination continues to passionately search for Blackhorse Soldiers.

I guess folks will brand me as prejudiced when it comes to Troop "G." H*ll yes, I am! Then as now I love those guys with feelings that are hard to describe.
