Our 23rd annual reunion was held on August 21-24, in Chicago, IL. Over 1,100 people attended the reunion this year. We would like to thank Jim Kaszubowski, the Chicago Reunion Co-Chairman, for his innovative ideas and for coordinating the onsite activities. Thanks to all the volunteers this year that helped make the reunion run smoothly. Thanks also goes to Steve Page, Reunion Chairman, for overall planning of the reunion.

We want to once again thank our guest speaker General Paul J. Kern for his remarks during the Saturday evening banquet. We surprised General Kern by having his former G Troop medic, Rex "Doc" Harold, introduce him. Neither had seen the other since 1LT Kern was severely wounded on August 25, 1968. General Kern remarked "I haven't seen him for 40 years. Thanks, not just for that introduction, but obviously for saving my life and getting me on that medivac." This is but one example of the numerous reunions between old friends that occurred during the reunion weekend.

We also want to thank the current regimental commander COL Paul J. Laughlin and CSM Fred Morris for attending the reunion and giving us an update on the activities of the regiment. We send our thanks and appreciation to all Blackhorse troopers for their service and wish them all the best in their continued mission at Fort Irwin, CA.

We had 60 troopers attending their first reunion this year. First timers were recognized and applauded by their fellow troopers during the Saturday evening banquet. One first timer said, "I don't know what took me so long to get here".

The Annual Business Meeting was held on Saturday morning. Elections were held for President and one Director. Incumbents Allen D. Hathaway (President Pro-tem) and Robert E. (Bob) Moreno (Director) both ran unopposed and were reelected to their present positions.

The membership approved a motion to modify the by-laws to add "Operation Embrace" as a standing committee.

The board asked the membership to approve a change in the eligibility criteria for the Reunion Assistance Fund to include immediate family members of our KIA's (parents, siblings, children and widows). The recommendation was approved unanimously by the membership. This now provides a means for some financial assistance to KIA family members to attend reunions if the need arises.

The hat was passed to replenish the Reunion Assistance Fund. Three troopers were helped this year so they could attend their first reunion. A total of \$3,280 was donated by our members. I want to thank all who have contributed to this fund at the Annual Business Meeting and throughout the year.

Consideration is being given to staggered terms for the four officers. The current by-laws provide that the president, vice-president, secretary and treasurer are elected in odd numbered years to serve a two year term. Under staggered terms, two officers would be elected in odd numbered years and the other two officers would be elected in even numbered years. All terms would still remain two years. Staggered terms would provide some continuity by overlapping terms. Any change to the by-laws requires a 2/3 approval by the voting members. Members are asked to submit any comments by e-mail or regular mail to the secretary prior to March 1, 2009.

Three reunion sites were presented to the membership for the 2010 reunion. They included Valley Forge, PA, Washington, DC, and Norfolk, VA. Washington, DC, was chosen by a majority vote of the members.

The annual raffle drawing was held on Saturday evening. The 1st prize of \$1,000 went to Michael Tavares (M Co, 3/11) of Nicholasville, KY. Michael donated the \$1,000 prize money to the Scholarship fund in honor of his friend Gary Wayne Gillis, M CO, 3/11, KIA April 7, 1969. The 2nd prize

of \$750 went to Harold Williams (HHT Regt) of Hampstead, NH. The 3rd prize of \$500 went to Grace Myrick of Robertsdale, AL. The 4th prize of \$250 went to Larry Holloway (A Trp, 1/11). Larry also donated his prize money to the Scholarship Fund.

This year proved to be another successful year for our calendar, raffle and silent auction fundraising activities. Through the generous donations from our members we were able to award 32 scholarships totaling \$98,000. We would like to congratulate the 2008 scholarship recipients who are listed in this issue. Special recognition goes to Christopher L. Stevens, son of Donald L. Stevens, who is the recipient of the Colonel Charles L. Schmidt Memorial Scholarship. Beginning this year and each year hereafter, each scholarship will be awarded in honor one of our KIA's.

Our 2009 Scholarship Fundraising activities will begin in early December with the mailing of our 2009 calendar to all members. Our members look forward to the calendar each year. We urge each of you to make a donation for the calendar for whatever amount.





2009 11th ACVVC Calendar Appeal

The first leg of our 2009 Scholarship fundraising effort will be in your mailboxes around Thanksgiving. The 2009 11th ACVVC Calendar will once again feature 12 new photos submitted by you! We want to thank all who have sent photos for consideration.

I once again appeal to your generosity as we ask for donations to support our Scholarship Program. Without your support the program would not be viable. Remember—we are not “selling” calendars. The calendar you receive is yours to keep and use whether you donate or not. We do however solicit your support with the most generous tax-deductible donation that you can make to assist the children of the 11th ACVVC members begin or continue their post-secondary education. The scholarships can be used for college, trade school, or any other educational training following high school.



Circle of Honor and Memorial Bricks

11th Cavalry Memorial Update

For nearly five years we have been working on the Memorial Restoration Project. The objectives of the project were: 1) To research, verify and correct all names listed on the 11th Cavalry Memorial to ensure all Blackhorse Troopers are accounted for, and 2) to repair and restore the memorial. In September 2007 after years of research, planning and preparation, and 40 years after the original dedication, the 11th Cavalry Memorial at Fort Knox was rededicated.

The memorial project needs your help. We currently have a

shortfall of nearly \$25,000 in the memorial fund for work already done. An additional \$15,000 is needed to complete the project to list the names of 11th Cavalry KIA's from World War II, The Philippine Insurrection and Mexican Expedition.

It was anticipated that the entire memorial project could be funded by the sale of granite bricks prior to the dedication in 2007. Approximately 1,100 granite bricks were initially available for inscription. To date, and one year after the dedication, 674 bricks have been sold with approximately 425 still available.




Introducing the Blackhorse Academic Scholarship Olympians

Olympic athletes are some of the most focused, disciplined, and dedicated individuals in the human race. As seen in many Olympic events, champions and medal winners are separated by mere fractions of a second. I think they are all “winners” for qualifying to represent their country in Olympic competition. What is particularly inspirational is that the vast majority of these superb athletes developed their focus, discipline, and dedication as adolescents.

Such is the case with our Scholarship Recipients who are all children of Blackhorse Combat Veterans of the Vietnam War. Our budget allowed for 32 scholarships out of 49 applicants. Four judges independently, on a maximum 30-point score, judged all applicants. The 32 winners had scores ranging from 28 to 19.5 points. *The top six winners ranged from 28 to 26.5 points. . . a variance of only 1.5 points!*

Christopher Lee Stevens of Florida, son of F Troop’s Don Stevens, achieved the highest point score awarded at 28 points, and received our special Colonel Charles L. Schmidt Scholarship Award. His High school Grade Point Average (GPA) was an amazing 4.5672. He is a member of the National Honor Society, a Math Honor Society, and won the Principal’s Honor Roll Award nine times.

Christopher’s focus and discipline began at an early age, as evidenced by him obtaining the First Degree Black Belt in TaeKwonDo at the young age of TEN! In addition to his studies and sports, he finds time to volunteer for community service and charity work, and also serves as a Mentor and Tutor to children.

The 32 winners had scores ranging from 28 to 19.5 points. The top six winners ranged from 28 to 26.5 points. . . a variance of only 1.5 points!

Since he was a child, Christopher has attended many reunions with his Dad. He plans to study either Political Science or Pre-Law, and hopes to influence improved veterans benefits and care upon graduation. His closing essay statement was, “I want to make my Dad as proud of me as I am of him.”

Rachelle Burns of Texas, daughter of Air Cav Troop’s Samuel Caldwell, achieved a score of 27.75, just .25 point (1/4 point) behind #1. Rachelle is another outstanding example of learning to be focused, disciplined, and dedicated early in life. She joined the U.S. Army shortly after finishing high school and served in active duty 1996-2006 including six years as a NCO. She was honorably discharged as a Staff Sergeant and is now enrolled in Texas Tech University’s highly regarded School of Nursing. Her cumulative GPA in her first two years of college is 3.75.

Her passion is helping people, as demonstrated by teaching English to children in an orphanage in South Korea, volunteering for fund raising work for charitable groups, participating in Christian Medical missions, and for advocating patients’ rights.

Joseph W. Stromberg of Kansas, son of M Company’s Wallace M. Stromberg, achieved a score of 26.75 as the #3 ranked recipient. This hard-charging young man graduated first in his High school class with a perfect 4.0 GPA and qualifying for the National Honor Society. Joe was Homecoming King, Class President, and

He has earned diverse honors throughout high school, including for theater performances, as Head Delegate to his school's Model United Nations class that was named Best Delegation during competitions in Michigan and Canada, as a soccer champion, and participating in volunteer and community activities.

Administration and Culinary Arts. Motivated by her experiences helping her parents with their small business, Kami's career objective is to own a catering business or restaurant. LIVING LIFE

There are two verses of the Bible that I've read many times but only recently gave them much thought. They're part of the Great Love Chapter of the Bible: I Corinthians 13. I read the verses about faith, hope, and love whenever I conduct a wedding. But the verses I'm talking about now give another slant. They have more to say about how we all live our lives - that is, in stages. The verses say, "It's like this. When I was a child, I spoke and thought and reasoned as a child does. But when I grew up, I put away childish things. Now we see things imperfectly as in a poor mirror, but then we will see everything with perfect clarity. All that I know now is partial and incomplete, but then I will know everything completely, just as God knows me now." (I Corinthians 13:11-12 - NLT).

As I grow older, I realize more and more how I live through stages where each period is different from other periods, or stages, of my life. Some stages are long, some short, but one stage is never the same as another. For example, one of my earliest memories goes back to when I was only four years old. In those days, little boys where I lived usually wore short pants. I could hardly wait until I was old enough to go to school (even to kindergarten) so I could wear long pants like the big kids. It's funny to look back on it now. But remembering helps me to understand little kids better now that I'm old (older, anyway). Another stage of my life was my twenty-seven years in the Army. That was a very long stage, I'll admit. But that part of my life was very different from my college and seminary days (another stage of my life). It was also different, much different, from my first retirement stage which was when I lived the full-time RV lifestyle in a motor home being a "Happy Wanderer."

A distinct stage-within-a-stage of my life was my two Viet Nam tours. I see this as a stage within my Army career stage. Serving as a chaplain in combat was clearly different from my life in other situations. This stage of living had a great influence on my whole identity. It was a benchmark of what I'd become from what

A problem for many vets is that when he/she comes out of a combat environment stage of life, he or she doesn't make the transfer of thinking and living that fits the next stage (or stages).

I was before I went to Viet Nam. This stage, by its nature, brought out strengths and weaknesses of my character that I would not have realized or dealt with had I not lived this stage of life in this way.

What I say about my life is equally true for your life too. I encourage you to think about it. There are things about the stages of our lives that are important to recognize, learn from, and deal with. Dealing sometimes means getting help. These thoughts don't cover the whole subject, but I want us to think about them, anyway, because they're important. It's important for you because your life really does divide into stages. We need to deal with and live each stage of our life in ways that are healthy, realistic, and how we really want to live - and in relationship to our Maker and the love of his son, Jesus Christ.

Back to my example, at age four I wanted to dress like the big boys who went to school. However, when I was seven and in the second grade, if I was still wearing the short pants from when I was four, then something was out of whack. This example is very simplistic, I'll admit. So take my Viet Nam example. In that case, getting shot at happened, so being fearful and reacting radically to loud noises was acceptable behavior, often it was even desirable behavior and could save my life. (Actually, it did just that). When I came home, even though I stayed in the Army for a career, permanently remaining fearful of loud noises and reacting radically would indicate that something was out of whack. I was now in a different stage of my life and needed to adapt with thoughts, behaviors and a lifestyle more in line with my present stage of life.

Like I said, I'm pointing out that, as we go through life, we go through different stages of living. Our bodies, our minds, our circumstances all change. We can't control that. It's part of growing, maturing, and just living. As we accept living

through stages we stay the same person, but we also change as a person. We are different from what we were before; we do not stay the same. Nor should we want to. After all, why should a seven year old act like a four year old? Or why should a man or woman who's looked the elephant in the eye in combat act like someone who's never left his or her home town? Things get out of whack when we progress from one stage of life to another, when we "grow up," but don't think and behave in ways that are more suitable to our present stage of life. A problem for many vets is that when he/she comes out of a combat environment stage of life, he or she doesn't make the transfer of thinking and living that fits the next stage (or stages).

I don't have time to go into much more detail, but I think you know what I'm trying to say. Let me just point out a couple more situations where some I've known have had trouble making it from one stage of their life to the next:

Some men get married, some have kids. Fine. A few don't make a healthy transition from the single to the married lifestyle. They don't just keep some of their old buddies. They actually hang onto their old lifestyle, running around and ignoring their family - their values are out of whack. Some vets go through heavy combat; WWII for my dad's day (that was when I was seven, wearing long pants!), Viet Nam in my day, then Desert Storm, now Iraq, and Afghanistan (among other hot spots and times). Most come out more mature, smarter about the world, tired, and battle-weary, but ready to move on with their lives and families. Some come home, get a job, have a family, and move along but can't separate out of their war-time stage of life. They have dreams, flashbacks, and other problems from a stage of life that they just can't let go of.

For all of us, it's helpful to realize that there are many stages of life and they divide up in many ways. We're all very different, so our life stages are different. What I hope you'll get out of this conversation is that you'll be very conscious of how your life is progressing through your different stages. I hope that you'll be able to separate the stages of your life. Realize that while you're growing and moving through your life, stage by stage, you are gaining as you go. You are growing. You are developing new and different characteristics. The old ones that you don't need anymore, go ahead and grow away from. The ones you want to remember and keep, do that. Choose what you want to keep and build on, then grow beyond the others as you live your life. You can do it. When you need help, like I already said, get it - it's there. Meanwhile, always remember - with God's help, you can do it.

God bless you. God loves you. So do I.

Blackhorse Hoofbeats

■ Echoes from the Regiment's Service in Vietnam 1966 – 1972

On 18 October 1967, a "Welcome Home" ceremony was held at Blackhorse Base Camp for the Second Squadron. The Squadron had been away from the Regiment for almost six months, serving with the 196th Light Infantry Brigade as part of Task Force Oregon in the northern I Corps sector of South Vietnam. The Squadron departed Blackhorse on 20 April 1967, arriving at Chu Lai several days later. The Squadron's deployment was part of General Westmoreland's reinforcement of the Marines due to the threat of overwhelming NVA operations coming out of North Vietnam and Laos. The Squadron was released back to regimental control upon the activation of the 23rd Infantry (Americal) Division.

Did you know that the Blackhorse had its own navy in Vietnam? Well, sort of. In December 1967, the Royal Australian Navy Helicopter Flight Vietnam moved into the Blackhorse Base Camp. Here's what they thought about conditions there: "Blackhorse, in the middle of rubber plantations and jungle was dependent on convoys from Long Binh to bring food, ammunition and fuel to it. It was also dangerously vulnerable to rocket and mortar attack. Its unsealed runways caused it to be extremely dusty in the 'dry' and, conversely, a sea of mud in the 'wet' so that take-offs and landings required more than

the usual exercise of caution." But they sure could drink a lot of beer! The Australian Navy left Blackhorse in November 1968, moving to Bearcat in IV Corps.

Quote from an anonymous Blackhorse Trooper at Fire Support Base Dennis in 1970: "The grunts are really weird sometimes when it comes to working with us. They gripe about having to walk around all the time and they honk about how easy we have it riding around, but when they're with us and we make contact, wow, they sure get back on the ground in a big hurry."

From the 2/11 Operational Report – Lessons Learned for the period ending 31 October 1971: "NVA (North Vietnamese Army) .51 cal (caliber) machine gun positions are arranged in a triangular pattern near a wood line with weapon emplacements located 25 to 30 meters apart. A secondary triangular set of emplacements is usually located 200 to 400 meters away covering the same sector of fire as the primary. When an active .51 cal position is observed and engaged, the NVA will attempt to relocate immediately to the secondary position when gunships depart station to re-fuel and/or re-arm. Upon return to the area and resumption of the attack on the primary position, aircraft are taken under fire from the secondary position. Once a .51 cal position has been observed and attacked, it must be kept under constant observation until destroyed to prevent relocation of the weapon during re-arming and re-fueling periods."



After sending these packages each lady is to notify me (Barb), or one of my assistants, of how much they sent, in pounds, and she would keep a record of it.

We had one contact me recently to let me know that they had lost everything in the flooding that resulted from Hurricane Dolly. By passing the hat we were able to collect over \$600. Along with this money we will be taking enough out of our treasury to bring the amount to a full \$1000. To our Blackhorse sister, we wish you well and please know that this gift was sent with lots of love from your fellow Blackhorse sisters.

Of course we discussed future fund raising options. All I can tell you right now is to stay tuned to this column and the web site for future developments.

The location sites for future reunions was brought up, and the ladies decided that we would like to be able to give our opinion of where we will be going in the future. I did promise that I would approach the Board of Directors with this request at their next mid year board meeting. Wish me luck, ladies.

We were able to certainly surprise Bonnie Schmidt at the banquet by presenting her with the 6th annual Blackhorse Women's Award. And surprised she was. Bonnie certainly did earn the honor of the award. She has been a true supporter and

lover of the Blackhorse. And she gives the best hugs of anybody I know. As I said at the awards ceremony, when you are married to a military person, you avoid making close friends because after a year or so one of you move away and most probably you never see each other again. In our 22 years in service I have allowed myself to become close to two women. One I met while stationed in Fort Knox, Kentucky and the other is Bonnie whom I met through a Blackhorse reunion. Both I consider my best friends. Ones whom I will stay in touch with always.

Bonnie, we all love you and you are truly a very good friend. One whom I will keep in my mind and heart all of my life.

He is truly my strength right now.
