

Our 25th annual reunion was held on August 25-29 in Washington, DC. Over 1,250 people attended the reunion this year.

Our thanks to all who attended and especially the volunteers who worked tirelessly to help make this another successful reunion.

Attendees began to arrive three and four days before the official start of the reunion to take advantage of the many sightseeing opportunities in the Nation's Capital. Registration opened on Wednesday and the crowd was eager to pick up their reunion packets. The "bunker" opened that evening giving those on hand an opportunity to meet up with their old friends. Don Snedeker, the Historian, prepared several display boards of newspaper articles tracing the history of the regiment from 1966 until 1972.

The weather was perfect on Thursday morning as the golfers headed out for the 19th Annual Marty Ognibene Golf Tournament. Many others spent the day sightseeing. The more popular locations were the World War II Memorial, Korean Memorial and of course the Vietnam Veterans Memorial. Many visited the wall throughout the week looking for names of old friends. Some brought personal mementoes to leave at the wall. Several groups held private memorial services to remember their buddies. Special placards were placed at each of the 109 panels honoring the Blackhorse troopers listed on that panel.

Approximately 150 attended the Veterans Seminar on Thursday evening. Our thanks to Danny Pummill of the Department of Veterans Affairs for hosting the seminar.

Early Friday morning several hundred traveled to Arlington National Cemetery for the wreath laying at the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier. The Tomb has been guarded continuously 24 hours a day, 7 days a week, since July 2, 1937. The changing of the guard is an impressive ceremony. It was truly an honor and priv-

ilege to represent our Blackhorse troopers as we placed the Blackhorse wreath at the Tomb.

More attendees arrived throughout the day. By Friday evening the large banquet room used for the "bunker party" was full and bustling with activity. Many brought old scrapbooks, pictures and newspaper articles to share with others. The silent auction was also held on Friday evening. This is always a fun and interesting part of the reunion where items of interest are donated and individuals bid on the items.

The Annual Business Meeting was held on Saturday morning. Prior to the start of the meeting we were honored to hear remarks from LTG Guy C. Swan III, CG US Army North, Fort Sam Houston, TX. As a colonel he served as the 57th Regimental Commander from 1996-1998. General Swan has attended many 11th ACVVC reunions over the years and is a real friend to all Blackhorse troopers.

Two sites were presented to the membership for the 2012 reunion. Fact sheets were included in each reunion packet summarizing the key points of each site including room rates, hotel amenities, transportation costs, local activities, etc, allowing each attendee an opportunity to view information on the two sites before making a decision. The Rosen Centre in Orlando, Florida was selected for the September 17-21, 2012 reunion.

Chaplain Larry Haworth conducted the memorial service on Saturday afternoon. The names of departed Blackhorse troopers who passed away since the last reunion were read. Members of the audience had the opportunity to speak about friends or loved ones lost this past year.

Our guest speaker this year was Joseph L. (Joe) Galloway who co-authored the book "We Were Soldiers Once.... And Young" with LTG Hal Moore (USA Ret). By coincidence, General Moore was also in town for another event. Both authors

spent the afternoon at a special book signing. It's not often both are in the same location at the same time. We thank them for arranging this very special opportunity for our troopers.

The Saturday evening banquet and program are the highlights of the reunion. The program opened with the presentation of the colors by members of the 3rd Infantry (Old Guard) and National Anthem sung by Air Force TSGT Carrie Holton.

We would also like to thank the current regimental commander COL Tony Aguto and RCSM Martin Wilcox for attending the reunion and giving an update on the activities. Included in the update was an outstanding video mixing scenes of the regiment from the past and present. We send our thanks and appreciation to all Blackhorse troopers for their service and wish them all the best in their continued mission at the Fort Irwin, CA.

We were honored to have 42 Gold Star family members attend this year representing 11 of the troopers killed in action in Vietnam. We hope they will continue to attend the reunions and encourage other Gold Star families to attend as well.

Also attending the reunion were the 61st Colonel of the Regiment (2004-2006) BG and Mrs. Peter Bayer and LTC Todd Walsh, CO 1/11 ACR (2008-2010).

It's been long standing tradition to recognize the troopers attending their first reunion. A total of 89 "first timers" were asked to stand and receive a "welcome home" round of applause from the audience. Many of them commented after the reunion they waited far too long to attend a reunion. (Take special note for those who haven't yet attended a reunion!)

The Saturday evening program was topped off by the Blackhorse Salute. This is always a very powerful and sometimes emotional portion of the program as we









1st Infantry Division base at Lai Khe.

As I remember, these were a more anticipated trek through the Vietnamese countryside versus what else it offered. A time to kick back a little, maybe unwind. As was the usual case selected crewmembers took everyone's order, we loaded up on one track, and headed down the road. It was about the closest thing we got to one of those Sunday drives back home. There were 8 of us telling stories, who's a two digit midget, the cars we were going to buy, and as that old Cav song went, the girl I left behind me, not to mention the usual harassment.

I'll never forget the first time I went to Lai Khe. From a distance it just looked like the standard rubber plantation. It was hard to believe an entire Army division was encamped in it with crisscrossing roads, an airstrip, and accommodations for around 15,000 men. Not unlike our own Blackhorse, but a tad greener. We pulled up to the PX, did our shopping, and headed back down the road with thoughts of cooking up what we'd bought and a quiet evening.

When we arrived back the entire Troop, aside from a few vehicles, was gone. This didn't look good and a radio call confirmed the Troop was given orders to react to contact. We were told to move down the road pronto and meet up with an element from M Company. At a T intersection sat an M-48 tank. An Air Cav Cobra was also flying by so low and slow the pilots were plainly visible giving a thumbs up. We followed the tank as it headed across a large open area. In the distance the wood line beckoned out of which came the familiar sounds of a battle in progress.

We punched into it and for as long as I live will never forget that jungle, an intertwined mesh of flora and fauna. For one thing it kept out whatever breeze was blowing on the prairie. The thick entanglement of trees that could rain monkeys, snakes, and wasps. The bushes that not only hid our enemy's presence, but also those nests of red ants. The vines that could rip your machinegun out of its mounts. Then there was the smell of it. As our tracks dug in to the floor they would bring a potpourri of earth, sap, and rotting vegetation. If it was burning and a rain

falling the smell was even more intense. Busting into it was like opening that bamboo curtain I'd heard about, but the show on the other side was anything but a metaphor.

Maybe "thick" is putting it mildly. Even though the staccato of battle was much louder now, nothing could be seen but the back of the tank and that stinking jungle. As we slowly advanced I finally saw some evidence of who else was in residence, a well worn trail and those small red cans of fish and green rice bags. Then some kind of bamboo structure came into view. It was then I saw the rear of another track. By whatever fate it was mine, I 22, old Double Deuce. Behind my gun was a man dressed in camouflage. So the ARP's were in on this too. I decided to make a run for her. Halfway there I heard "fire in the hole" and hit the deck. This explosion brought a little fallout and some ringing in my ears. I finally made it onboard and was told not to fire my weapon. What?

The reason being, the ARP's were running around blowing bunkers. Come to think of it the only small arms firing I'd heard was the distinct crack crack crack of AK-47's. That and explosions. Ours were announced, theirs weren't. From what I could gather the NVA were popping out of their holes and taking potshots at targets of opportunity with RPG's and small arms. I did see one track with a big splintered hole in the engine hatch, wondering the fate of its crew.

If this wasn't enough excitement, I heard trees snapping off to my left, looked over, and saw the muzzle brake of a 90mm cannon coming straight for us. The tank finally came into full view, both the TC and driver looking off to their left and screaming in their CVC's. I waved with all I had. Yelling had no effect between diesel, gunfire, and explosions. The driver finally looked our way and hooked a left before we were T-boned. These moments did get intense, even chaotic, if not a complete melee.

Bursts of AK fire were pruning branches over our heads when an order came down from the Platoon Sergeant to all Track Commanders to dismount their gunners with rifles and hand grenades and start blowing bunkers. I can't say that one

was received all that well. Leave the security of our 14 ton ACAV, no matter how ridiculous that sounds. I'd seen my share of hulks scattered around the AO, one literally melted on a road. So off we went into a fray of tanks and tracks pointed in all directions, the ARP's running around, and my first encounter with the NVA whose tactics weren't the usual Viet Cong hit and run I'd experienced.

We weren't there very long when the recall order was given. A Huey was circling overhead with "Higher-Higher" in it. That would be Colonel Patton at the time. We were told to back up and get on line. At least two tanks began spiraling outward busting down the jungle until a fair sized LZ was made. The Huey landed and I remember seeing the Colonel jump out with 45 drawn and barking orders on a PRC-77. As soon as he landed he was off again. The tanks got in front of us and we all made a sweep across the bunker complex. An Air Cav LOACH radioed that he was in pursuit of some NVA. Maybe whoever was left had made a run for it while we were regrouping. In effect, it was over.

Or so we thought. We were ordered to remain in place for the night in case those NVA came back. So much for our quiet evening and don't think anyone was in the mood for a cookout. I know I didn't get much sleep that night. Unwanted guests were one thing and I was still wound up. It was also evident the Sunday spell hadn't been broken. After all, this was Vietnam and as the song by Spanky and Our Gang went, "Sunday's just another day!"

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
Show Your Pride

The last few months have brought some changes to the Blackhorse. As many of you know on 30 June I assumed command of the Regiment. Additionally LTC Christopher M. Doneski took command of 1st Squadron, LTC A. Brian Robertson took command of 2nd Squadron and LTC Lance R. Eldred took command of the Regimental Support Squadron. Also CSM William Tramel assumed responsibility for 1st Squadron and SGM Stephen C. Young assumed responsibility for 2nd Squadron. It was an exceptional event and a great introduction to this historic Regiment. I was especially honored to meet those veterans that were able to make the trip. I appreciate the time, effort, and support of all our veterans.

I was commissioned an Armor Officer from the United States Military Academy in 1988. I have tried my entire career to get to the 11th ACR. I deployed with 3rd Armored Cavalry Regiment to Operation Iraqi Freedom and also had the privilege of commanding 4th Squadron, 2nd Stryker Cavalry Regiment in support of Operation Iraqi Freedom in Baghdad and Diyala, Iraq. With my assignment as commander of this distinguished Regiment I am truly a "Lucky 16". My wife Melanie and I are both honored to be part of the Blackhorse lineage and tradition of the 11th Cavalry.

July found the Regiment back in "the Box" training 1st Brigade Combat Team, 1st Infantry Division from Fort Riley. Our first rotation taught the new command teams a lot about our Regiment's mission. However, the most important thing we learned was the versatility, independence, flexibility, and commitment of our Blackhorse Troopers.

In August we trained the 3rd Brigade Combat Team, 1st Infantry Division from Fort Knox in preparation for their deployment to Afghanistan. This presented a great opportunity for the Blackhorse Troopers to execute Troop level attacks on Combat Outposts. A different skill set then our traditional rotations, the

Blackhorse Troopers excelled as they won every engagement.

Following the rotation RCSM Wilcox and I were able to attend the 2010 ACVVC Reunion in Washington D.C. We had a wonderful time. It was great getting to know those who made the Blackhorse legendary. We look forward to seeing many of you next year. Our only regret is that we could not get the entire Regiment to Washington D.C. and allow all of our Troopers to join in the camaraderie.

In September we had a rare three weeks without helping to train a rotational unit. We took advantage and executed platoon and company level Situation Training Exercises. Additionally our Infantry Troopers had the opportunity to compete for their Expert Infantryman Badge (EIB). After some grueling physical and mental tests 33 Blackhorse Troopers earned their EIB. We will close out September putting the 2/34 Brigade Combat Team, National Guard from Iowa through their paces as they prepare for deployment to Afghanistan. In October we will train the 3rd Brigade Combat Team, 1st Cavalry Division.

In November the Regiment itself will head to the Box where we will have the opportunity to rehearse and certify Hybrid Threat Operations (HTO). Hybrid Threat combines elements of counterinsurgency and conventional force maneuvers. Representing the next generation of Army training, it is designed to deliver realistic, high-intensity scenarios to rotational units. The Blackhorse is excited to be a part of this new development and we look forward to building our maneuver skill set. Once again the Blackhorse will lead the Army into the next generation of training for conflict.

I look forward to meeting many of you during my time with the Blackhorse. If you ever find yourself in the High Mojave please come out and see us. All Blackhorse Troopers are always welcome.



Hootches, Barracks, And Clubs

In the old days when I was draft age, I joined the Air National Guard. I was going to college part-time and didn't want the military getting in the way, especially not the Army! Then, President Kennedy called up the Air National Guard for the Berlin Crisis and there I was, on active duty anyway. In the Air Force!

So you say, "Why are you telling me this?" I'm telling you my little tale because when I get to my main story, I want you to understand that I like the Air Force just fine, having been there. After I joined the Army and went to Viet Nam, I saw what a huge difference there was between how the Army lived and how the Air Force lived.

"What're you talking about, Chaplain," you ask? Well, think about it. We, the Army and they, the Air Force, sometimes shared the same piece of real estate, like at Bien Hoa. For us it was our rear base camp. For them it was their main base. I clearly recall certain ways of how we lived. Like Air Force guys lived in barracks! I kid you not - wooden barracks in Viet Nam. On the Army side we had hootches or GP medium tents with wood floors. Our hootches were made largely from artillery ammo pallet wood someone had scarfed up (not to be confused with barfed up) from somewhere. Supply got tin for the roofs and concrete for the floors which was just fine. Those Air Force barracks weren't scrounged wood, they were wood from the States cut for that very purpose - to make barracks. You probably won't believe this: the Air Force called them dormitories. Hey! (or hay!). Am I playing mind games? Nope. It's true. They called them dormitories - just like in college. And they were two stories! Would you want to sleep on the second floor in one of those nice buildings? I don't think so. When they got mortared, do you know what direction the shrapnel would fly? You're right, up and right into the second floor, through those fine wood walls, and into their beds. Want to live in an Air Force dormitory in the Nam? Thanks, but no thanks. Comfort only goes so far.

Now to the paint. Whaaat? Yes, the paint. Do you remember what colors we

had for painting our hootches? You're right - gray, white, red, and black. That was it - we were hard-core Army. Well, what about those wooden barracks/dormitories? That was a different matter. They had all sorts of pastel colors - beige, blue, green (not OD!), yellow and some more that I don't recall (I don't think pink). That was just for their doors, real doors. Our doors were planks of wood that sort of covered the space. Ours were painted gray, except we were cav so some were painted red and white. Cool. Oops, I just thought of something - sometimes we hung those plastic strips in the inside to keep out flies. We bought them from the mama-sans. Remember?

Then came the hardware. Huh? You know - the gadgets that made the doors close. Oh, yeah. My recall isn't as sharp as it used to be, but I still remember that a few of our hootches had a spring to close the doors. I think it was probably officers and NCOs that had springs. Most of us had a more practical door closer - old inner tubes cut into strips, then nailed with one end to the door and the other end to the door frame. Presto - door closer! Our doors banged shut. No matter, it wasn't the same bang as in the field which you know about. On the Air Force side, at least at Bien Hoa, those two story dormitories not only were painted pretty colors, but they had real hardware. "You're puttin' me on, Chaplain," you say. "No, I'm not," I reply. Real hardware - brass door knobs, brass hinges and whatever else the Air Force

guys needed, just like at home. No matter to us; just kind of strange, what with being in a war and all.

There's something else that goes along about living in the rear - the clubs! I vaguely recall the Army side having a tent where guys could go for a cold one or to sit and relax. That is, if you could get to the rear. The Air Force side had a real club - a place where Air Force guys could go relax after a hard day's work. It was a place where the pilots could go let off steam after flying missions over North Viet Nam or supporting us in the bush when Victor Charlie was giving us some trouble. Their club was in an actual building, not just a make-shift place to stick a few tables and a keg or two. Their club was also a place where our troopers sometimes went to unwind - I said, unwind. You know what I mean when I say unwind. I doubt if Army guys were invited which didn't much matter. They went anyway. The Air Force guys didn't always cotton to Army guys coming out of the bush and making a mess of their club. Hey (or hay!), our guys, fresh from the bush, needed to unwind too! This they did by duking it out with the Air Force guys, only with fists and fun instead of firefights and fear.

Speaking of the club, our Army guys really got a bang out of watching the Air Force guys in their club when air raid sirens went off. An incoming round would land a mile up the runway and flyguys



Depended on what you were used to. I wasn't there, but I think the Army guys finished off a few cold ones while the Air Force guys were splitting for their bunkers.

Remarkable, isn't it, how our needs got met - a place to crash, a place to relax and such. I learned a whole lot about what I really needed in my life and what I didn't. I think you're the same when you think about it, which you're doing right now since I mentioned it. It's like what Jesus

had to say about taking care of whoever believes in him. He said, "Look at the lilies and how they grow. They don't work or make their clothing, yet Solomon in all his glory was not dressed as beautifully as they are. 11TH ACVVC CALENDAR **11TH Armored Cavalry's Veterans of Vietnam and Cambodia**



The 11th U.S. Cavalry was formed on February 7, 1901 at Ft. Myer, Virginia. In December it was assigned to duty in the Philippines where, in 1902, the 1st Squadron would earn the first of the Regiment's many battle streamers, "Samal 1902".

In the Mexican Expedition of 1916-17, the 2nd Squadron engaged Pancho Villa's men on May 5, 1916 at Ojin Azules, Mexico, killing forty-two enemies in the last mounted cavalry charge in U.S. history.

The Blackhorse Regiment would see action in WWII where it earned five more battle streamers, but the Regiment's finest performance would be in the Republic of Vietnam and the Kingdom of Cambodia. Blackhorse Troopers served there for 2,000 days and earned eleven battle streamers.

In June of 1991, freedom called and the Blackhorse rode again, wearing it's most recent battle streamer in Operation Desert Storm.

The 11th Armored Cavalry returned from Iraq at the end of 2005, and has since again assumed the challenging task of training America's Army in the desert environment of Fort Irwin, CA. Although the primary mission is preparing units for deployment to the war in Iraq, our Regiment is simultaneously training intensively to remain the best Regiment in the United States Army! During the recent deployment fighting in "Operation Iraqi Freedom III", the famed Blackhorse Regiment continued to uphold the great legacy established by Troopers who fought the war in Vietnam and Cambodia.

Blackhorse Hoofbeats

Echoes from the Regiment's Service in Vietnam 1966-1972

• From the Third Squadron Combat Operations After Action Report for Operation Hickory in October 1966: “7 October: At 2355 hours the Squadron CP [Command Post] came under attack by the VC who emplaced command detonated claymore mines around the CP. The best estimate of what occurred is that approximately four VC infiltrated to within fifty meters of the CP perimeter...and emplaced four claymore mines 25 meters apart. The intended direction of the blast would carry fragments between the outer perimeter elements into the command and control vehicles. However, one VC tripped a flare illuminating his position and alerting the perimeter. The VC fired one claymore after being brought under fire by the perimeter. One US casualty was sustained from the blast of the claymore, while one VC was believed hit by perimeter fire. The following morning revealed three remaining claymores in position but incomplete for detonation.”

• Colonel George S. Patton's Commander's Note, dated 29 July 1968: “This war is a strange mixture of both military and political factors. Many things happen that can only be explained politically. Suffice it to say that there is a political problem to everything the Vietnamese do. The key and the emphasis today is to strengthen the ARVNs [Army of the Republic of Vietnam] before we withdraw so that they can take over. This is one of COMUSMACV's [Commander, US Military Assistance Command Vietnam] prime missions. We will support him and we must help the ARVN whenever possible. Do not criticize them openly... Everyone should know at least the key phrases needed to communicate with the Vietnamese. Example – ‘Get down,’ ‘Where is the enemy,’ etc.”

• The 919th Engineer Company (Armored) was one of the first Blackhorse units in Vietnam, arriving almost a full month before the rest of the Regiment. It was the only armored engineer company to serve in Vietnam. Blackhorse Troopers came to rely on the 919th to routinely work miracles, and

they were never disappointed. Whatever the situation called for, the Red Devils' seemed to always have the solution. Mid-1969 was typical. Over the stretch of three months (May, June, and July), the engineers of the 919th displayed the full range of their talents. For example, the 1st Platoon, supporting First Squadron, conducted tactical mine sweeps along Highway 13 near An Loc, locating and destroying three 30-pound anti-tank mines. Using an Armored Vehicle Launcher Bridge (AVLB) and bulldozer, they then constructed Fire Support Base Greene – including clearing jungle, constructing a berm, two helicopter pads, and vehicle fighting positions – for the Squadron command post. The 1st Platoon then became part of a convoy escort all the way to Bien Hoa and Blackhorse Base Camp, providing both protection for the resupply trucks and AVLBs for crossing obstacles. The 2nd Platoon, supporting Third Squadron, also conducted road sweep operations in the Lam Son district. In mid-June, sharp-eyed 2nd Platoon Engineers spotted a group of enemy soldiers, bringing them under fire. Over a three-day period (along with India Troop), the 2nd Platoon accounted for almost 45 enemy casualties. Several days later, the 2nd Platoon accompanied Mike Company, providing flank security while on the move and searching and destroying bunkers as they were encountered – including a battalion-sized complex with over 20 log-reinforced emplacements, which they blew up with explosives. Meanwhile, 3rd Platoon was attached to the Third Squadron, air assaulting a dismounted mine sweep team on Highway 13 near Quan Loi, locating and destroying several anti-tank mines. In early June, along with engineers from the Big Red One's 1st Engineer Battalion, the 3rd Platoon helped to construct Fire Support Base Howard, a new night defensive position for the Second Squadron's Howitzer Battery, one platoon from Fox Troop, and a company of infantry. The 3rd Platoon's defense-building skills – and war-fighting skills – were soon put to the test, when elements of the 165th NVA Regiment attacked just after midnight on the 6th of June. Just one day later, a 3rd Platoon mine sweep

team, working with Golf Troop, ran into elements of the same 165th NVA Regiment, and again one month later between Quan Loi and Loc Ninh. Over the course of these engagements, the 3rd Platoon helped in reducing the 165th Regiment's morning report by over 120 soldiers. The 4th Platoon, along with the Company's maintenance section, was located at Quan Loi, supporting the Regimental Headquarters by conducting road clearing, culvert and drainage ditch repair, and base camp improvements. On the night of May 12th, when NVA sappers breached the wire at Quan Loi, 4th Platoon engineers put away their mine detectors and shovels, grabbed their M-16s and M-79s and plugged the hole. For the next several months, the 4th Platoon was kept busy improving Quan Loi's defenses, building base camps for US and South Vietnamese units (to include a fortified village), sweeping for mines, emplacing persistent riot control crystals (CS) in a VC village, conducting civic action projects, improving the Quan Loi airstrip, and reacting to convoy ambushes. In this latter case, the 4th Platoon gained some distinction, when, on July 17th, their Combat Engineer Vehicle (CEV) was “put to extensive and effective use” to help defeat an ambush. Regimental records indicate that, to “our knowledge, this is the first time the main gun of a CEV was fired in combat in Vietnam.”

• From the Second Squadron Intelligence Summary for the period 1 to 16 January 1971: “On 3 January at 2035 hrs [8:35 PM], a night flight conducted with the 2d Squadron CO [Commanding Officer] observed a truck on QL-1 [National Highway 1]... Approx 10 minutes later F Trp, 2/11 ACR captured the truck and 2 VC [Viet Cong] with it. Truck was found to be loaded with 19,700 pounds of rice and 40xcases of beer. Further interrogation of the indivs revealed that they were part of the Shadow Supply System and were in the process of delivering the rice to the VC when they were captured.” The report does not indicate what happened to the beer, but there were some big smiles on the faces of the Eaglehorse Troopers.
